JUNE 2020 Paula writes Another Letter from Lockdown



How did you celebrate VE Day?

Some of you, I know, remember the actual day 75 years ago: a tremendous sense of excitement, relief, and thanksgiving. For many families that was tinged with sorrow and pain, knowing that beloved relatives were never coming home.

This year's celebration, of course, was meant to be a major national event: but had to be confined to remote TV coverage, the simplest of public ceremonies by Prince Charles – and lots of

tea parties with neighbours getting together at (I hope) a safe social distance.

But people responded. Many put up bunting, determined to celebrate: determined, perhaps to show that we would win through the COVID crisis as the country won through the crisis and disruption of the Second World War. For in that wave of positivity, the colourful joyful bunting seemed to defy the power of the virus: a statement that the country would not be beaten: that however disruptive this time is, however long lockdown continues, we stand confident of better times to come and in solidarity with our community. Hadstock, I know, is standing strong too.

We are about to enter another phase: a summer very different from what we expected. No Fete. What about holidays? Will things really gradually open up, or are we in for a prolonged bumpy ride? We don't know. We are learning not to make assumptions about the future.

At our Zoom service on 10 May, Bishop Roger preached on Jesus's words at his Last Supper with his disciples: *Do not let your hearts be troubled*. The word for *trouble* here, as used originally in the Greek Gospel text, indicates deep disturbance: not a little niggle, but the real churning anxiety which can grab hold of us in our darkest moments when there seems to be no way out. Yet the most frequently repeated commandment in the Bible is not to be afraid. When Jesus said those words, he knew he was about to be crucified: he was facing no easy option.

But the central message of the Christian faith remains Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again: and that nothing in life or death, not coronavirus, nor social distancing, nor our separation from our loved ones, nor anything else in all creation, can separate us from the love of God. May we trust in that love, whatever the road ahead leads us.

CHURCH IN TIME OF LOCKDOWN

As you know, all church worship is SUSPENDED because of COVID-19, and all church buildings are closed. The Government statements suggesting they *might* reopen from early July are very conditional, and the Church centrally is examining what steps need to be taken to do safely. We shall need to follow that advice when we have it – so there is no certainty yet about when Hadstock Church can reopen.

But worship continues at home!

The Saffron Walden and Villages Team Ministry is working together to make sure that everyone has the opportunity to take part in prayer or to join virtually in a service, either pre-recorded or live through Zoom technology.

We are producing each week a sheet with prayers (and hymns!) You can use this:

- To pray at home, by yourself or with other members of your family.
- To follow a pre-recorded YouTube service, led by the Revd Alex Jeewan (Team Vicar in the Cam Villages – the Chesterfords, Littlebury and Wendens Ambo). Go to the **Church at Home** page on the website of St Mary's Saffron Walden (www.stmaryssaffronwalden.org)
- To join in a live Holy Communion service at 9.30 am each Sunday, usually led from my home, through Zoom.

St Mary's **Church at Home** webpage also has imaginative ideas for Bible-based activities for children and young people.



Bishop Roger is also coming for a Q and A session for the Saffron Walden and Villages Team Ministry on <u>Sunday 14 June</u> at 4 pm by Zoom. Do join in – and perhaps ask him a question!

<u>Did you know</u> you can access Zoom by your phone – even if you have no computer? Let me know if you would like details of how to do this.

I am circulating a weekly Hadstock Worship Bulletin by email with the prayer sheet and the links for the Zoom service. This already goes to the regular congregation, those on the readers' rota, and others who have asked for it. Please let me know if you would like to be added to the circulation, or would like a paper copy posted to you. And please do ring if you would like to share any worries, or just want a friendly chat!

Many thanks for your support up to now for this Village Hall fund raiser Hopefully you will able to support us in this way in the future.





The Starlings and the Doves

By the 1950's the Church fabric had been neglected and there were much needed repairs to the tower. There was a split down the south side of the tower and the roof needed re-leading. In 1952 Laurence King, a famous London church architect, was appointed to oversee the work together with his favoured contractor, Dove Brothers. King felt that the lime trees along the south wall were destabilising the foundations. These were felled, the tower cracks filled and the roof replaced

It is a tradition that the plumber (i.e. lead worker) fixes a plate to record his work. This plate is on the tower roof and records this work. It has a rather nice inscription.



REVD JR HOLMES RECTOR LAURENCE KING LONDON ARCHITECT DOVE BROTHERS LTD LONDON BUILDERS R. MORRIS FOREMAN L. W. STARLING NORWICH PLUMBER THE STARLINGS WORKED IN HARMONY WITH THE DOVES

Dove Brothers were based in Islington and were a well-known building contractor, employing 220 people at their peak. The firm had been founded by William Spencer Dove and then taken over and expanded by his three sons in 1852. They worked for all the major London architects of the time including Sir Giles Gilbert Scott and built 130 churches, mostly in London. The firm closed in 1993.

LW Starling of Costessey, Norfolk specialised in re-casting church lead roofs.

Joe Holmes was Rector of Hadstock from 1949 to 1965. Continued on next page

Starlings and Doves continued

In the end the repairs were unsuccessful (apart from the roof) and the tower cracks reappeared. They were not rectified until 1969-70 when it was realised that the problem lay with the tower staircase taking too much of the weight.

There are two other such plates on the tower roof: "1952 Dove Brothers, Islington" and "2007 Bakers of Danbury". Rick



The Archbishop of York writes in Thursday's <u>i</u>
Newspaper encouraging support for a real Living Wage for all care workers.

'Carers need funding, not applause'

"I feel like a Roman Gladiator in the ring, clapped by cheering crowds as I risk death." These words from a brave care worker stopped me in my tracks. The story came to my attention through my work with the Living Wage Foundation. This person, who asked to remain anonymous, does this vital work on a zero-hour contract, paid just £8.72 an hour. The clapping this Thursday is a kind gesture -but it won't pay the rent.

The fate of the country is in the hands of people like this brave care worker. It is just morally wrong to put our care workers up to face infection and potential death, with limited personal protective equipment (PPE), and to do that for poverty pay. Almost half of all care workers are earning below the real Living Wage. For me this is simply unacceptable. And while so many of us across the country take to our doorsteps every Thursday at 8pm to clap for carers and other key workers, this week my prayer is that we begin to show real compassion and protect our key workers; whether British, European, or even former refugees who are the most at-risk groups when it comes to catching COVID-19. They are literally risking their lives for us, day in, day out, and do it for a wage that means they struggle to stay afloat financially.

When I see problems in the world around me, I begin to look for solutions. The Bible resounds with the cry for justice and of compassion. In Isaiah we read, 'Learn to do right; seek justice. Defend the oppressed. Take up the cause of the fatherless; plead the case of the widow.' For the Psalmist this imperative is rooted in the character of God: 'The Lord loves righteousness and justice; the earth is full of his unfailing love.' Psalm 33.5. If epidemic is to teach us anything, I hope it will be to draw us back to justice, compassion, and love.

What can we do to care for carers? What compassion can we show them for their work looking after our loved ones? How do we lead them to their springs of water? Well the least we can all do is organise to get them a decent living wage. This is what hundreds of community leaders and organisations from Citizens UK, are doing right now.

Archbishop of York Continued

Today (Thursday)at 8pm, they are launching a campaign alongside care workers from across the UK, to call on Her Majesty's Government to prioritise the proper funding of social care, ensuring that in every case care homes will pay a real Living Wage to their staff (currently £9.30 per hour UK wide and £10.75 in London). They are also asking that people coming from abroad to care for our elderly and vulnerable don't suffer in poverty, paying very large Home Office fees on top of low wages.



One of the features of The Hundred Parishes website is a section on famous people from our area. There is a short account of each of 21 past and present celebrities, from



Dick Turpin to Jamie Oliver. Gustav Holst is one of these and I make no apology for repeating text from our website here:

GUSTAV HOLST (1874-1934)



While teaching and composing in London, Gustav Holst began a love affair with Thaxted after a walking holiday in the area led to his taking a weekend cottage nearby. A great attraction must have been its cathedral-sized church with spacious, white-painted interior, where he became involved with local music-making, encouraged by the town's socialist vicar, Conrad Noel. Holst himself was an active socialist.

In 1916, Holst invited some of his London pupils to spend

four days of music-making in Thaxted in the town's first Whitsuntide festival. Sadly, this was repeated for only two more years before being moved to London to avoid Holst's pupils, especially those from St Paul's School, becoming associated with Noel's controversial extremist left-wing sermons. It was 1980 before the highly successful Thaxted Festival was re-established.

Holst stayed in Thaxted for several years working, amongst other things, on his acknowledged masterpiece, The Planets. He adapted the big melody from "Jupiter" to accompany the poem "I vow to thee, my country". This became a popular hymn and Holst named the tune "Thaxted". It has since been used for no fewer than fourteen other hymns worldwide as well as the anthem of the Rugby

World Cup. Holst also composed the music for a popular Christmas carol, "In the Bleak Midwinter".

During these days of social distancing we are not able to travel and enjoy our beautiful area as much as before, but we can remind ourselves of what is out there and read about our rich local history on the Society's website.
