MARCH 2021 Paula writes: Are we on the cusp of a new future?



At last, aided by vaccines, can we look to gradually coming out of COVID lockdown; into a world which will outwardly look the same – yet be different?

Recently in church we reflected on the Old Testament story of Noah. Just imagine yourself in that story. What was it like for him and his family, afloat in the ark with all those animals for nearly a year while the great flood overwhelmed the world, until dry land appeared? Or to come out, knowing that God had chosen *YOU* and your family to make a new start, not just for yourselves but for all creation? Where would you begin? Where will we begin, now?

Change is part of our lives – yours, and mine. I step down as Priest at Hadstock on 30 June this year. The time since my licence was extended in 2019 has gone in a flash. It's been a great privilege – and great fun – to be with you for these years and to feel part of this community. Of course, it's strange: my last Christmas at Hadstock; my last Annual Parochial Church Meeting; my last Easter. There will be time later for goodbyes as I hand on the baton. But there are new starts too, as we welcome Jeremy Trew as the new Team Rector of Saffron Walden and the Villages on 3 March. Can we get back into church this month? Let's hope so; but it's not in our hands as Government and Diocese ponder the figures and assess step by step. But whether we celebrate in church, stay on Zoom or pray at home, God is with us. As Christians this month remember and follow Jesus's journey to the cross, we do so in trust that the way to the cross is also the way to resurrection and new life: a new creation, in which we are all invited to take part. And we do so remembering that Jesus himself was born as one of us, his mother Mary experiencing a real pregnancy with a human child growing within her.

I end with words from former Archbishop Rowan Williams, reflecting on the post-COVID world in the light of this wonderful birth. "The God who begins the story of his world-shattering life in the midst of creation with that tiny, imperceptible change in the body of Mary is still a God who works with tiny and hidden changes. In each of us, body and spirit, the same God is working now, so that Christmas and Good Friday and Easter will come alive in us, in ways we can't begin to imagine."

May you too feel the strength of God and Easter joy as we journey to new things.

NEW AREA FOR CREMATED REMAINS

As reported in the December/January Magazine, the PCC has applied to Chelmsford Diocese for permission to set aside a special area in the churchyard for interring ashes, and the Diocese has now agreed.

In the application we had to give details about the type of stones which would be used. We aim to keep the area looking simple but not regimented, and to provide an overall coherence without requiring absolute uniformity. The Diocese have agreed that we can use small headstones, no more than 45 cm (18 inches) high, of Portland stone or granite (but not black or polished granite). Full details will be given to families who wish their loved ones to be interred in this beautiful spot.

Many thanks to Tim Boyden for his work in clearing the area and defining the edge with stones which had been disassociated from graves many years ago.

We also have permission to fell two trees at the back of the church, which will open up the view of the church from the new graveyard area.





Walking the Icknield Way from Hadstock

Having an ancient long-distance track running so close to our village is one of the many advantages of living in Hadstock. In late October I wanted to investigate it further and set off just before first light in the direction of Linton. I felt like doing some pondering so went by myself – something that I had never done before for a long walk.

The sun came up as I got to Linton, and the gently breeze was going to be on my back all day.

After Linton there was a climb to the water tower, with great views back over Hadstock. Then on downhill and through several fields to Balsham, where there is an old milestone pointing to the two ends of the path -43 miles north-east to the Peddars Way and 63



miles south-west to Ridgeway.

From Balsham there is a solid, straight track, 'Fox Lane' running straight for many miles before zigzagging through several villages: Willingham Green, Brinkley, Burrough Green and eventually after bridges and woods, Stetchworth.

Devil's Dyke Crossing

The landscape changes subtly as the main features come and go; approaching the Newmarket area the scruffy fields give way to immaculately trimmed hedges around the racing stables. The footpaths were variable – sometimes well kept, sometimes deep in mud.



Unfortunately, there were no cafes or pubs open along the way, but several welcoming benches for refreshment stops. The sunshine seemed to be too good to last, and for the last 10 miles of the walk I was hit hard by two short drenching squalls, one spent in a bus shelter in Cheveley, the other next to the church at Dalham.

As the horseracing influences diminished the countryside became interesting and varied again with old malt kilns, churches, windmills, impressive mansions and tiny cottages.

It was getting dark as I walked through Gazeley. As we had planned, I phoned Gill who picked me up at Needham Street after I had walked 25 miles in 11 hours. I didn't expect to get that far; one down-side of doing a linear walk is getting back home again – a 60-mile round trip by car.

I thought that it would be an interesting experience, but I didn't realise how much I would enjoy it; the whole day was exhilarating. I would definitely recommend it for anyone with a day to spare, good legs and a willing driver.

The route was well signposted and easy to follow with the Walkers Guide that I had bought from the Icknield Way Association, also containing a bit of history and geography of the places on the way (happy to lend the book to other villagers). When the paths dry out, I will do the walk in the other direction, to Royston and Baldock (at least then I can

get a train most of the way back to Hadstock).

At this difficult time, we are fortunate to live in such a lovely area where we can take exercise close to home in attractive and interesting surroundings. One of the local delights is the number of thatched buildings.



Thatch was once the roofing choice of the poor as it was locally sourced, inexpensive and sustainable; now it seems that only the better-off can afford the necessary regular servicing and replacement. Most roofs are thatched with long wheat straw and many are topped out with a decorative straw feature on the apex. These are called straw finials.

Pheasants and foxes are still among the favourites for this tradition that goes back centuries. These finials may once have been installed to keep away birds or even witches, while some may have been the trademark of the individual thatcher. Today, they are more likely chosen by the customer from an online catalogue. They seem to be more abundant and varied than ever.

I have spotted some fine examples around The Hundred Parishes such as the two running hares on a cottage at Ashdon. In Finchingfield and Radwinter you may find families of ducks and there is a large thatched cow on the barn of the Red Cow pub at Chrishall.

You may see a hare on Dick Turpin's Cottage at Hempstead or a galloping horse at Great Bardfield. High Roding has a delightful cat stretching up the chimney stack and a fox chases a hare in Brent Pelham. An eagle has landed in Aythorpe Roding and there is a flying pig in Ugley.

The 16th-century Thatchers pub at Hatfield Heath is appropriately situated on a road that was once part of the route for horse-drawn cartage of wheat from Suffolk to London.

Do keep looking up!



Do you know it is a few years now since Hadstock Village Hall Twinned its toilets via donations to Toilet Twinning .org. The money was raised from donations given after coffee mornings and afternoon teas held at the village hall and 2 toilets were sponsored. Toilet Twinning.org has now been working for 10 years in some of the remotest and marginalised places on earth to bring clean water and sanitation. The following is an exert from the TT publicity - the story of Purna....

Flushing Away Poverty for people like Purna

Purna's Himalayan village in Nepal is beautiful and tranquil, but remote. So, if things go wrong, life is extremely precarious.

When Purna fell dangerously ill with diarrhoea, her two sons took turns to carry her on their back to reach the nearest hospital in the city. The doctors said that if they'd left it much longer, she probably would have died.



All her life, Purna has gone to the toilet in the open because she doesn't have a toilet at her home. Until our partner organisation started working in her village, she didn't know about the link between sanitation and health, and had no idea that going to the toilet outside was putting her health – and life – in danger.

Purna represents just one of hundreds of thousands of lives we've helped transform during the past ten years of Toilet Twinning. Thank you for being part of Purna's story of transformation!

So-How does it work? TOILETS, TAPS AND TRAINING – A LIFESAVING TRIO "WE ARE FLUSHING AWAY POVERTY, ONE TOILET AT A TIME."
