Parish Church of St Botolph's - APRIL 2021

Paula writes: - Spring is here! Its wonder never fails, as the bareness of winter first peeps

and then grows and then bursts into new life, light and colour.

The other day, on a warmish afternoon, we heard a deep humming sound in the garden. *Hundreds* of bees were thronging round one of the bushes – a sort of willow – to forage pollen from the yellow woolly catkins: often three of them on the same catkin. The next morning a robin perched on a little apple tree, took a good look round, flew on to the grass, picked up something in its beak – and dived straight into the middle of the same willow. Every day the blossom spreads in the hedgerows, pure white against the sky. Hares and deer enjoy the fields. There is a sense of creation working together: animals, insects and nesting birds rejoicing in the wonder of

spring. May we care for our corner of creation, and rejoice with it.

It always seems so fitting that spring and Eastertime coincide: that the darkness of winter and the darkness of Jesus's crucifixion burst into the light of spring and the joy of his resurrection. After this long, hard, lockdown winter, whatever the future may hold, may we too feel in the beauty of this April a promise and foreshadowing of God's eternal spring in his eternal kingdom, where death and pain will be no more.

The C17 priest/poet George Herbert described in his poem *Easter* how he had worked to gather flowers to decorate his church for Easter Day, but found that God had been there before him in the beauty of the Easter morning;

I got me flowers to straw thy way:

I got me boughs off many a tree:

But thou wast up by break of day,

And brought'st thy sweets along with thee.

['Sweets' here means 'beautiful things'.]

It is wonderful that we can hold Easter services in the church this year — which we couldn't do at all last year. And it is lovely too that Bishop Roger will be coming on Easter Eve to confirm five candidates from Hadstock — the first confirmation in the church for many years. Please pray for them and their families: may this be a special and blessed day in their lives, and their Christian journeys.

And may the joy of Easter be with you and all those you love.

HOLD THE DATE: 23 May 2021

Hadstock Parish Boundary 'Rogation' Walk

'Beating the bounds' is an ancient custom dating back to Anglo Saxon times at least, which involved swatting local landmarks with branches to maintain a shared mental map of parish boundaries.

It is traditionally done on Rogation Sunday, the fifth week after Easter, which this year is 9 May. All being well we should be able to gather in groups of 30 by 17 May, so we are planning a group walk of the parish boundary on the first Sunday afterwards, i.e., 23 May.

There will be more information in the May magazine about how to sign up for this, but if you know that you want to take part already, please let Gill know at gillbee@hotmail.com. Maximum 30 places. Are there any volunteers who would like to document the walk too, through writing and photos? Or the medium of mime? Any ideas to make this (even more of) a fun activity, please let Gill know.

The walk itself is around 11km (8 miles) and much of it is over private land so we will need to stay together and keep to the route being agreed with local landowners. There will be a number of stopping places for refreshments/lunch and chance to gather so expect to be out for about 3-4 hours.

HADSTOCK PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

There has been a lot going on around the Village in recent weeks.

A couple of years ago, in response to several requests, the Parish Council confirmed that it would arrange for the Children's Play Area on the Rec. to be surrounded by a fence, to ensure that small children were safe and secure. Despite some delay due to the 'prevailing conditions' over the last year, the contractor completed the work on Friday the 19th of March. We hope that Hadstock residents with small children make good use of the area as the weather (hopefully) continues to improve - and dog owners, please, are asked to keep their pets outside this space. Notices to this effect will be posted on the Play Area entrance gates soon. Nearly all of the cost of this has been met by grants.



Meanwhile we have started an on-going programme of minor repairs to the existing play equipment which will be completed in a few weeks.

If regulations allow later this summer a 'spruce up and picnic' event for the Rec might be fun. The hedges around the Rec. have been cut back and a new bench seat will be installed soon.

At the far side of the field the Village Heritage Orchard has made a start with the planting of 8 fruit trees supplied by the East of England Apples and Orchards Project and paid for by Uttlesford.

This will be extended over the coming years with further planting of fruit trees and native meadow flowers. A display board will be installed describing the history of these particular local varieties and their fruit.

The Orchard is there for all to enjoy and you will

eventually be able to pick the fruit and enjoy a picnic at picnic tables.

Above all the Recreation Ground is there for all to enjoy and have fun.

The Recreation Ground is one of the best assets that Hadstock has and we want to diversify and increase its usage. Send in any suggestions for further improvements.

Elsewhere, part of Len's Path has been resurfaced at the village end where it was particularly muddy. Reports suggest this has been successful but the crushed concrete finish is not to everyone's taste. We are waiting to see how this works out before embarking on more extensive (and expensive) work at the Linton end with the same contractor where flooding requires excavation and drainage to be installed. The use of road planings as the top finish will be investigated.



Tim Boyden has done sterling work rebuilding the steps at both ends of the path between Bantons and Arnold's Lane which had become dislodged and slippery. Thanks Tim! Take the walk and try them out



Guilds were an early form of trade association. They became established in the Middle Ages by groups of merchants to control standards and promote their



particular craft or skill in the locality in which they operated. Some acquired sufficient funds and status to erect their own premises or Guildhalls in market towns. These buildings were used for meetings and other functions by the guilds. Some were designed to allow markets or trade on the ground floor.

The Hundred Parishes has some wonderful surviving examples of guildhalls. <u>Thaxted is</u> probably the best known - three storeyed, timber framed and jetted, built in the 15th

century. Thaxted was an important centre of cutlery manufacture and it is believed the cutlers helped to fund the building we now know as the Guildhall. Its original purpose is uncertain; it may have had broader uses as a moot hall or civic meeting place. The building later became a school and today it is used for parish council and other meetings and incorporates a small museum of Thaxted's history.





The guildhall at Linton was built in 1523 and is now a private house. It was once the home of Sir John Kendrew who was awarded the Nobel Prize for Chemistry in 1962.

Finchingfield's 15th-century guildhall stands beside the parish church. In the past it was used as almshouses and now the renovated building houses a library and

excellent museum. The first floor is used in non-Covid times for courses and is available for private hire.

In Church Lane Clavering you will find a 15th-century timber-framed and plastered building. Now a private dwelling, it was built as the guildhall

and later served as a workhouse and then almshouses.

<u>Ashdon's former 15th-century guildhall</u>, behind the church, also later served as a workhouse before becoming a private house.




