Parish Church of St Botolph's AUGUST 2021

Caroline writes:

Am I my brother's keeper? This is the question that the Bible tells us that Cain puts to God after he has killed his brother Abel. It is a question that is very topical today. The answer, in a complex society such as our own, is surely 'yes'. We have responsibility not only for our own actions but also for the effect that they have on other people.

There has been much talk recently of assuming personal responsibility now that Government restrictions on behaviour and movement are being lifted, but this cannot be considered without taking account of the effects that my actions may have on you. I may dislike wearing a mask, or being unable to sing in church, but - like keeping to a speed limit – my actions may well threaten your health or even life. The problem for the Government has been to balance the interests of one group (those whose livelihoods and mental health have suffered so badly during restrictions) against another – our hospitals and their staff and individuals whose health may be in jeopardy. I don't envy our politicians that responsibility.

Churches, like local businesses and other venues, are having to grapple with such questions now that overall rules have ceased to be imposed.

We have now met as a church council and come to some important decisions about how we plan to go forward. You may well have noticed that the Church building is now open again. We are delighted about this, and thankful to those who have offered to open and close daily to make it possible. In terms of our services, we plan to keep social distancing in place, with certain pews out of use, and to suggest that you only sit next to anyone with whom you are in close everyday contact outside church. Given the social distancing that is possible in our lovely building for most services, we do not think that wearing a face covering is necessary, although some may prefer to continue to use them.

In line with other churches in the Team, we will resume congregational singing, but will expect people to wear a mask when they sing – so don't forget to bring one! Singing with a mask is not as difficult as it sounds, and we will see how it goes during August. Our main concern is that people should feel that it is safe to return to church, and that we do not endanger others by our actions.

Aside from COVID, I am enjoying getting to know some of you now that I am taking services regularly at St Botolph's. Summer tends to be rather a quiet time in church, with no major festivals and a number of people often away. However, we are looking forward to two Baptisms in the Church in August in addition to twice monthly Sunday services and a weekly time of Morning Prayer every Tuesday.

Of course, holidays are also more complicated at present. You may be unable or disinclined to risk foreign travel in a search for guaranteed sunshine, and local options – such as holiday cottages and even camp sites – seem to be very booked up. Whatever you will be doing, I hope this may be a time to enjoy the wonderful countryside that surrounds us. At present the rain and sun are making everything – including the weeds – grow very fast, so there is plenty to keep us busy in our own gardens.

Speedwatch

I think most Hadstock residents are aware of the Speedwatch (CSW) activity on the B1052 road through the village – but for newcomers, here's an update.

Speedwatch operates throughout Essex, (and in varying forms in neighbouring counties too), under the auspices of Essex Police, as groups of volunteers undertaking speed monitoring at sites in their home areas. CSW groups have speed detection devices and record instances of speeding vehicles, which are then passed to Essex Police who issue formal warning letters. Volunteers in Hadstock (usually three of us) must wear Hi-Viz jackets and put out additional 'Speedwatch in Operation' signs by the side of the road.

CSW in Hadstock has been operating for about 8 or 9 years now and our aim remains the same - to inhibit speeding in the village - either by our highly visible presence or by passing on details of drivers, who, despite '30mph' limit signs and 'Speedwatch' signs continue to drive well in excess of the legal limit. We are all aware of what a serious and frightening danger to village residents/walkers/dog-walkers such drivers are.

Of course, we can only do so much and the group, some of whom have been participating since Hadstock CSW was established, usually has a session once a week for an hour, primarily at 'rush hour' times in the morning or evening. Sometimes it's quiet, but invariably we approach double figures of drivers who are recorded because they are driving substantially above 30mph – having ignored all warning signs. Recently someone was recorded at over 60mph ! – this driver was specially highlighted to the police.

I'd like to thank all the volunteers (several new members were trained recently) who give up their time to try to make Hadstock a safer place.

On a recent visit to Thaxted's Tourist Information Centre, I could not resist buying their new set of postcards, featuring some of the town's well-known



views. Nowadays, it is quite unusual to see postcards for sale - and even rarer to receive one in the post. How times have changed.

Picture postcards became extremely popular in the UK after the introduction in 1902 of the format with a picture on the front and a divided back - half for the address and the other half for a message. Pictures were generally black and white but sometimes coloured. Popularity waned after the First World War but it remained customary to send postcards to family and friends from somewhere visited on holiday or a day out. That custom has now almost died out, no doubt due in part to the availability – albeit only in this century - of more immediate means of exchanging messages and photos electronically.

Many people used picture postcards for sending short messages. Until 1918 it cost only an old halfpenny to send a card – that's 480 cards for a Pound (today's price is 66 pence per card). In those early days, there could be as many as five postal deliveries in a day, at least in towns, so it was not unreasonable to expect a reply the same day.

It wasn't just seaside towns that sold postcards; almost every town and village had its own postcard or set of postcards. Within the Hundred Parishes, it seems that only one parish has never had a postcard – Flitch Green, which became a parish only in 2008. Many of those old cards have survived. They often provide a revealing insight into our past and into an earlier way of life, for example buildings, roads, transport and dress.
