

#### HADSTOCK BOOK CLUB

November's book club read was Isabel Allende's 'A Long Petal of the Sea', chosen by Gill. It's an epic historical narrative following the lives of Vincent and Roser, and those close to them, from the end of the Spanish Civil War. They flee to France, only to be interned in appalling conditions, and just before the outbreak of WWII gain passage on a ship commissioned by the poet Pablo Neruda to bring Spanish refugees to Chile. Their story continues in exile in Chile, a country they come to love, through the repressive Pinochet regime to the 1990s.

In discussing the book, it was considered to be an interesting read about a period of history and a region (Chile and S America) that wasn't so well known to us. Some felt the characters were not as well explored as they might be because of the focus on the historical events, the pace and the amount of detail covered, but on the whole it was felt to be an informative and enjoyable read.

There are several posts to explore in a range of media, mostly referring to the last 100 years.

Glimpses: This post is a gallery of photographs that show how Hadstock has changed since the turn of the century.


The oldest photos are especially intriguing: such as that of Marcus Barker in the 1900s with his harvest piled



high in sacks on a huge waggon pulled by a steam engine. One's thoughts turn to health and safety issues as one notes the children on and close to the steam engine and the men on top of the sacks.

One of my favourites is taken outside the Queen's Head pub. It shows three women, dressed in their best, black outfits with two children, squeezed into a tiny trap, rather precariously to my mind. At least the pony standing between the shafts looks well-behaved. Where are they going and where is the driver? Has he stopped off for a quick drink, or is he the person apparently making a delivery to the pub?

Several posts are written articles taken from Crocky's *Memoirs* collection in "Hadstock Through the Centuries". If you haven't already read Reg Woods' account of village life, you have missed a treat! The icon shows him at work in the village shop, which he kept after the war. He knew most of the inhabitants of the village during his years here and tells many a tale about them. You may learn something of previous inhabitants of *your* 

#### home!

Jock Dawson's impact on Hadstock villagers in the mid-20<sup>th</sup> century is made evident in Paul Young's and Crocky's posts, whilst Hilda Peck, born in 1892, gives us a wonderful insight into growing up in Hadstock more than a hundred years ago.

I found the three episodes of Hadstock Histories fascinating and recommend you listen to them. These podcasts were made by a group of younger people in the village, who interviewed some long-time residents about their reminiscences. Tabby Hannam, Dylan Abbiss and Freddie Doyle, who were the interviewers, added their own insightful reflections as they compared their subjects' childhood with their own.

The overall impression is that Hadstock was a great place to be young in the 1960s, 70s and 80s. It seems that the youngsters all played together in or at their favourite gathering places: Hadstock House, the den behind the church, the recreation ground, and the village green. The telephone box also had a part to play.

There were cubs, scouts and a youth club as well as a flourishing football team. The roads were quiet enough for street activities. Continued over the page


You can listen to Spike talking about some of these, including the pranks they played and learn from Crocky how the cub mistress disciplined her cubs.

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#### ASHDON SCHOOL REPORT

It has been great to return to having all of the children back together, socialising with one another, after spending so many months apart in 'bubbles' as part of the Government's strategy for managing Covid-19. They enjoy spending break and lunch times together and having daily whole-school assemblies.

We have also been able to restart having parents into school-run events, such as our weekly Sharing Assembly, where our children proudly show some of their achievements from in and outside school. Parents have also been able to support Class 1's 'Safari', where the children walk around our village, focusing particularly on scientific and geographical features.

As 2021 enters its final month, we anticipate seasonal celebrations to brighten the shortest days of the year. The ancient tradition of decking our houses with

garlands of fresh green holly branches reminds us of the continuity of life, bringing us cheer when the days are short.



On reaching the age of 20, female holly trees bear red berries on branches covered with prickly shiny green leaves which can be cut to make decorative wreaths. Such wreaths featured in midwinter Celtic and Roman celebrations as symbols of good fortune, a tradition that continues thanks to the intervention of a local man, William Winstanley (1628 – 1698).

During the Commonwealth which lasted from 1649 to 1660, the Puritans under Oliver Cromwell proclaimed that it was illegal to celebrate Christmas, banning frivolities and feasting on mince pies. Winstanley, who lived in Quendon, believed in celebrating Christmas as a time for sharing joy, fun and good fortune with others. After restoration of the monarchy in 1660, using his influence as a writer, he encouraged a return to the seasonal merrymaking which we still enjoy today.

Holly trees were frequently planted near houses to ward off a lightning strike; interestingly scientific research has revealed its spiky leaves can act as miniature lightning conductors! Holly also grows in hedges or as a shrub in woods where its berries provide nourishment for blackbirds, thrushes and wood mice. Its dense branches provide secure nesting sites. Deer and rabbits will eat its nutritious leaves.

Today, many homeowners plant variegated forms of holly to provide interest in their gardens and they can select a mixture of foliage to make seasonal decorations.

Yew is another evergreen with red coloured fruits (loved by birds and squirrels), but as its leaves are poisonous it is less suitable for indoor decorations.
