Happy New Year: what can we hope for in 2022?

'There's good days and bad days' says someone struggling with Parkinson's, or another person just coping with decline on account of age. This has always struck me as a very brave statement of acceptance of life as it is.

Yet there is also the phrase 'tomorrow will be a good day'; words that Captain Tom Moore chose as the title for his autobiography. Here we move on from acceptance of life's ups and downs to a statement of hope, perhaps even of determination, for sometimes tomorrow is a good day in part because we are determined that it will be.

What, I wonder, is the basis for our hope that tomorrow will be a good day? It may be the return of summer – after all, we have passed the shortest day now, and someone even said they had seen snowdrops in their garden. The changing seasons give us all a basis for hope when days are dark, damp and muddy.

Faith is said to offer a sure ground for hope. It is this that we celebrate every Christmas, since we believe that Jesus showed us the nature of God's love and introduces us to a relationship that nourishes and sustains the spirit. In the Bible this hope is described as an 'anchor for the soul' – something firm to hold on to when all around us changes, or seems to be going wrong. In the light of faith, Christmas is not a once-a-year event that is over when we pack away the decorations, but the foundation of a process that is life giving.

You may find this hard to believe or simply too much to swallow. I think that one of the strongest statements of faith and ultimately of hope are the words that were found on the wall of a cellar in Cologne during the Nazi occupation:

- I believe in the sun even when it is not shining;
- I believe in love, even when feeling it not;
- I believe in God, even when He is silent.

These words have been turned into song, and the source is even disputed, but still, they strike a chord. They are words that are hopeful because they declare that the good things continue, even when our everyday experience hides them from view.

New Year is a good time to ask ourselves not only what we hope for in 2022, but whether these hopes have a firm base. Even in relation to trivial things – such as a desire to lose some excess weight – there is not much point in hope that has no foundation. In this instance, the foundation might simply be a determination to stick to eating healthy foods or to take more exercise.

In more serious matters, we cannot always affect the outcome in such a direct way, yet we may still retain a belief in the ultimate goodness of life. A belief that behind all the mess and controversy and even cruelty that exists, there is a force for love and goodness.

As I wish you Happy New Year, I do so wishing, that for you tomorrow WILL be a good day, and that 2022 WILL be a good year, and that this hope may have a secure and firm base for you, even if things are not always easy.

You have a great sense of community in Hadstock, which will help to make such hopes a reality for friends and neighbours.

You can see from the shape of the roof that the problem is that the battens have failed requiring the roof to be stripped, timber repaired and retiled.



over the builder's tender.

Five grants have been applied for and to date \pounds 16,250 has been granted from two. This leaves a current shortfall of \pounds 5,420.

Hopefully the three outstanding grant requests will yield a bit more.

Luckily the roof hasn't deteriorated over the last few months and remains watertight thanks to the felt underlay,

- but we cannot be sure for how long.

The total cost of this is estimated to be about $\pounds 51,000$. This roughly breaks downs as: tiles, battens, felt, lead copings etc. $\pounds 22k$, timber repairs - $\pounds 3k$, gutters etc - $\pounds 4k$, stripping, preliminaries etc., contingency $\pounds 11k$, scaffold & alarm - $\pounds 4k$, architect - $\pounds 4k$. There is an alarming increase in building materials cost and we have

included an extra contingency of £3k



BE PART OF ST BOTOLPH'S STORY: -SIGN A ROOF TILE

You will have read Rick Albrow's report about the current state of the Chancel roof and what is required to repair and re-instate this. As Rick's report shows, there is a shortfall of \pounds 5420 which still needs to be raised, before it is possible to instruct the builders.

The Friends of St Botolph have been looking at ways where all of us living in the village and enjoying the presence and sight of such a fine building as the Church can be involved in contributing to the reinstatement of the roof tiles.

> On the Chancel roof there are -6000 tiles(approx.) 130 courses of tiles An average of 45 tiles per course

All roofing materials on the affected side of the roof must be removed and it is hoped that we will be able to re-use around half of the tiles.

We would like to offer everyone the chance to sponsor a tile, a number of tiles or a course of tiles.

Each section is worth a visit but I have taken a particular interest in the ironmongery found on the various field walks in particular the horseshoes and nails.

Last year, the members of the Hadstock Society Committee spent many a happy hour sitting in the Village Hall car park sorting through the bags of items found on the field walks. COVID restrictions prevented us from sitting in the warm and dry of the Village Hall but sitting out in the rain somehow created the right kind of atmosphere!

A fairly large pile of ironmongery started to grow in the 'probably not worth keeping' pile but I noticed that some of the horseshoes did not look like the ones I had seen in my encounters with farriers in recent years.

One in particular caught my eye (see below) and a visit to Google indicated that it could be medieval. It's difficult to see on the pic but there are 3 nail holes on the left and one on the right. There are also 2 broken nails on the right making 6 holes in all. There is also a 'caulkin' at the end of one side (top



right) which is described as a medieval 'dove shoe' in Ivan G Sparkes book 'Old Horseshoes'. A caulkin is a blunt projection on a horseshoe that is often forged, welded or brazed onto the shoe.

I therefore gathered up all the rusty metal and arranged a visit to the Saffron Walden Museum to seek their views on our finds.

Interestingly, in Autumn last year the Museum exhibited some ancient horseshoes and so it was therefore appropriate that I could share our finds with them.

I visited Carolyn Wingfield the Curator the Museum in November and I am delighted to say that Carolyn confirmed that some of our horseshoes could be medieval.

Horseshoes have distinct shapes and patterns relating to the era in which they were produced. In the days before the internet and national media, horseshoes throughout the country followed a similar pattern during specific periods. In particular, horseshoes forged in the 14th and 15th centuries were much wider than modern shoes. They also had a specific number of nail holes relative to the era in which they were produced.

I produced this display of horseshoes below for the Hadstock Society AGM an I'm continuing to research them. I'd rather like to clean them up but I suspect that is not approved of in archaeological circles. I'd welcome views on how to clean them. I wondered about Coca Cola?

That's probably heresy!

Under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981, Natural England can designate any area of land considered to be of special interest by virtue of its fauna, flora or geological

features as a "Site of Special Scientific Interest" or SSSI. This designation ensures that the area is appropriately managed and protected. The Hundred Parishes has more than twenty SSSIs. I will mention a few that can be visited.

In the parish of High Easter, Garnett's Wood comprises 25 hectares (62 acres) of ancient coppiced woodland (meaning the trees have been regularly cut down to ground level). Mentioned in the Domesday Book, this wood, in which the lime is the dominant tree, was given in the 12th century by Henry II to a knight called Geffrey Garnett. A stump of a tree has been carved to depict the knight, still watching over his wood.

Patmore Heath in Albury parish is an 8-hectare grass heathland, now a scarce habitat in South East England. It is managed by Herts & Middlesex Wildlife Trust. A variety of native grasses grow here and the heath's ponds are home to all three native English newt species: great-crested, smooth and palmate.

Amwell Quarry, formerly an area of gravel pits, has been transformed into a 37-hectare wetland environment, important in particular for wintering wildfowl and regarded as England's premier site for dragonflies.

Best-known and by far the largest of our SSSIs is Hatfield Forest which covers more than 400 hectares, around 1.5 square miles. It was a royal hunting forest from around 1100 AD until the 15th century. It has never been ploughed and has been managed for centuries by coppicing and by pollarding (cutting trees to a height above which livestock and deer cannot reach the new shoots). It has been owned by The National Trust since 1924.
