RECTOR'S LETTER - REV'D JEREMY TREW JULY 2022

Jeremy writes



In my less-wise moments, I would like to think that I am indispensable, but thankfully I am aware that I am not.

Of course, if I did think that I would have plenty of company.

Many of us like to think that our work/home/ group of friends/etc (delete as applicable) would grind to a shuddering halt and collapse into chaos the moment we were absent. Thankfully this is usually not the case, and when it is, it is often a result of bad management. In my role as a Rector I am responsible to ensure there's someone there to take the services on any Sunday I am away. Thankfully I

have others who coordinate this, and there are many skilled people to call upon for assistance. This has not always been the case, and some years it has been very difficult to find the support needed. Clergy are often not very good at taking time off, and I know of colleagues who would have stayed around if a problem cropped up. However, we might cloak our reasons in humility, it is actually pride that prevents people from letting go. We think we are too important to absent ourselves and so we treat ourselves as unimportant.

We all need holidays. Holidays are about much more than recreation. They serve an important role in our re-creation. This role was at the heart of the foundation of the first National Parks; the realisation that people need spaces which allow them to be re-created, remade. These spaces help repair the "wear and tear" of daily living; recognising that just as our bodies are continually replacing worn and damaged cells, so we need to repair our tired minds, emotions and souls. Christians see this in a God who was not only at the heart of creation as a one-off event, but who goes on creating and re-creating; "Behold, I make all things new," as the Good Book says. Maybe that's because God did not view us as some clockwork machine to be set loose and allowed to run about until our spring ran out, but as a more fragile vessel to be nurtured and re-formed as we live and grow. So, if like me you find it difficult to take time off, throw away that "Protestant Work Ethic" (it's neither Protestant nor Christian anyway) and enjoy a bit of re-creation with your recreation.

Repairs to the Chancel Roof are underway at last!



Our contractors, CEL, started work on 15th June with the erection of scaffolding.

By the 24th all the old tiles had been stripped and temporary sheeting installed. Thankfully no major problem has been found and all the rafters are sound. The roof had failed due to the use of poor nails holding the battens nearly all of which had rusted away. The battens had also not been installed in the best way so that a slippage of one course tended to put excessive weight on the courses below. The roof was installed in the 1970's. The old tiles themselves are generally in good condition (they are particularly heavy) and will be salvaged wherever possible. The rest will be new handmade clay tiles in a lighter colour but they will weather in over the years. We were lucky to find a supply of suitable tiles at all.

There are some technical issues concerning the finishing of the roof around the edges, the dormer and chimney to make it the best possible both architecturally and structurally which have been agreed between the

Happiest Days of Our Lives?

On the archive pages of the village website, archive.hadstock.org.uk there is an award-winning essay, written by Bertha Stone, giving a fascinating insight into her time as a pupil at Hadstock School. Bertha started at the school in 1907 and she describes her time there as 'happy days' and the pupils as being 'well content'.

On reading this essay, I was struck by how many traditions had remained the same over fifty years later e.g the separate entrances and playgrounds for boys and girls. I can clearly remember the sign on the entrance to my primary school saying 'No Parents Beyond this Gate'. The avoidance of the toilets had certainly not changed!

Electricity had replaced oil lamps and heating had appeared, albeit in the form of gas fires, that gave off fumes and where the crate of playtime milk gradually curdled while we chanted our times tables. Gingham dresses had replaced white pinafores. Bertha's class sang their own music in dancing lessons as they had no piano. We danced around the Maypole and on St. Patrick's Day we wore green crêpe paper skirts and the boys sported green and gold sashes for our Irish dancing. Unlike Bertha, we had school holidays but no half - terms yet.

Bertha describes their much-loved infant teacher, who pinned the flowers they brought her to her black pinafore. In contrast, this triggered a memory for me of a teacher, appropriately called Miss Paine, who did not believe in 'sparing the rod'. In her case, the wooden top of a pencil case rapping knuckles for ink blots or a cane for more serious misdemeanors e.g not being word- perfect with catechism answers.

If you were 'lucky' you might be chosen to be the class monitor for the day. Long before the words 'Health and Safety' and 'Safeguarding' had entered the educational lexicon, Miss Paine one day asked me to go to the post office, buy twenty stamps and post a letter. I was so terrified of getting it wrong that I repeated the instructions all the way there.

Happiest Days continued

No-one batted an eyelid at the seven-year-old girl, alone and out of school mid - morning. I duly bought the stamps, stuck them on the letter and posted it. I returned to class feeling quite proud that I had followed Miss Paine's instructions only to incur a wrath never to be forgotten (or forgiven!) I was never asked to be monitor again.....What a relief!

Village Hall AGM held 23rd May 2022. The Chairmans' Report

2 Villagers attended the meeting.

We are delighted to be fully open once again and able to meet our brief of providing a venue for the benefit of Hadstock residents.

Although closed since Spring 2020, we have been very busy. There always seemed to be the possibility that opening could be an option, subject to ever changing rules and regulations. Risk assessments had to be updated every few weeks as the advice on indoor meeting / numbers / use of face masks / hand washing / Sanitising furniture / one-way systems / isolation area for anyone falling ill / was constantly updated.

Restrictions were finally lifted in February 2022 but many people still felt that the incidences of infection warranted caution.

Obviously, no lettings and no Fete, meant no income although costs continued – particularly heating, insurance and repairs. Various grants were available and details of the help we received are given in the grants report.

We were able to carry out external work to increase the useable outdoor space: erecting a pergola and increasing the size of the patio, a new shed for storage, outdoor furniture, improved external lighting and indoors the installation of hand dryers.

We had planned to improve the hall frontage and held £7000 in reserve for this. However, we did not get the grant for matched funding. Although building costs have, and continue to, increase we hope that this project may be achievable in the future.

Repairs to the roof and guttering were necessary. There have been continuing problems with the boiler and our internet access for programming the heating but the engineer visited again last Thursday and everything seems to be in order.

Regular hirers are returning although some have problems returning to pre-covid numbers. The quiz made a welcome return last month and we are feeling optimistic.

We have 2 new members to the committee but would still welcome more members. Please contact us if you feel able to help.

HADSTOCK FETE NEWS

There was keen and competitive bidding in the auction with a final total of just over £2,050. 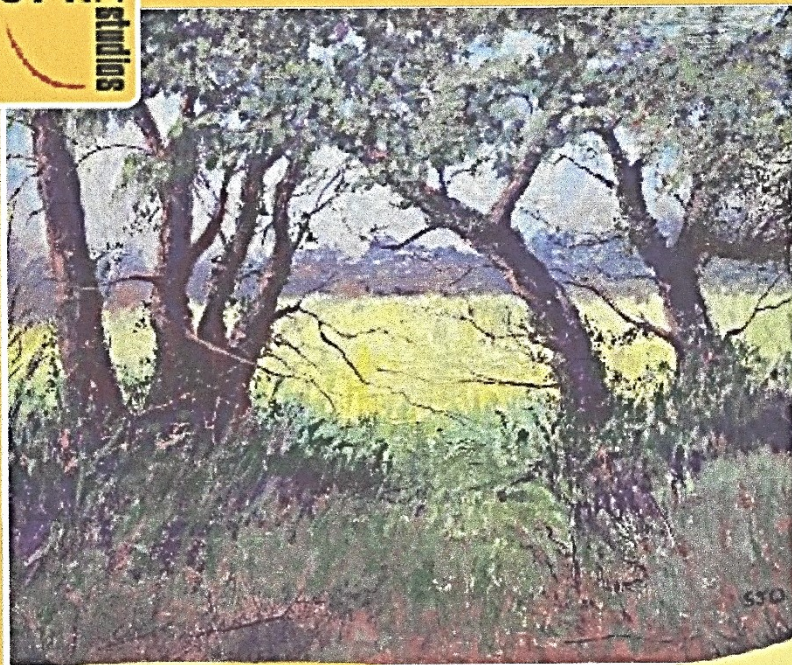
