Dear Readers,

I am going to be serious for once.

On 28 July Woman's Hour on BBC Radio 4 discussed the shocking fact that women with learning difficulties die on average 26 years younger than females in general.

The discussion included businesswoman and former Director-General of the CBI, Dame Carolyn Fairbairn now the Chair of MENCAP talking about how the life and death of her learning-disabled sister Diana, is shaping her new role at Mencap. It seems that Diana who could not speak or communicate, was in hospital as she had an infection. This had cleared up and she was due to be released to be at home with her family at Christmas but had been put in a room alone as she 'made noises.' While alone, she had got into difficulty while eating but was unable to summon help or use the red button as she did not know how or understand it. Very sadly she died. Dame Carolyn said that she is determined in her role at Mencap to ensure that other families do not experience what hers has.

Why am I interested in this now? Well, very recently my own niece has died aged 47, only 18 days after being diagnosed with having extensive Cancer. Stephanie could only speak a few words (one of them being butterfly). She had epilepsy and learning difficulties and was like a very young child despite having physically grown up. She had lived in a very caring Care Home, one of 6 people there. Should we have been able to find out about her illness much sooner so she could have treatment? The answer must be Yes. This problem of assuming everything is alright because the person being cared for cannot communicate otherwise has to be dealt with, in care homes or hospital situations and applies to men too who have learning difficulties.

RECTOR'S LETTER - REV'D JEREMY TREW - AUGUST 2022

Jeremy writes I don't know what your experiences were, but at my school careers advice was rather useless. The best bit of advice I ever received was at a family get-together for my father's side of the family. Everyone there was either a teacher or a chartered accountant (remember – no-one chooses their family). Their advice was; "Jeremy, whatever you do in life don't become a teacher or an accountant." It seemed like good advice and I took it. August must be a blessed relief for teachers. At long last they've come to the end of a long



academic year, and they have earned every minute of the break they're enjoying. Though, it is a relative break, as time off from children does not mean time off from preparation, paperwork and the like. Also, for many, it is not the profession they joined: Children now face examinations almost from starting school to satisfy the neurosis of a control society; That very same society also demands that schools take up many of the basic educational tasks that were once the responsibility of society itself and especially the parents. The culture of the Bible, and particularly the Old Testament, viewed children as one of God's greatest blessings, an unmerited gift whose existence blessed the whole of society in turn. With such a belief hovering in the background it is not surprising that the nurture and care of those children was seen as a shared responsibility, and not just the task of parents, or preferably qualified professionals. This is part of the reason that I value Church and other faith schools. Their existence demonstrates that the nurture of children is more than merely a devolved responsibility, but is fundamental to the human task, just as faith is fundamental to human meaning. Maybe we can learn from this: To look at the tasks that others do and recognise that our welfare is in part dependent on their labour, and theirs on ours; And, to accept that this gives us a mutual responsibility one-fortheother. Maybe then we will not be so ready to offload our responsibilities on other people, but will be more willing to face the needs of our society collaboratively. So; thank you to all in our community who, in one way or another, help nurture our children. May you have a refreshing break. Thank you also to all who, through their work and volunteering, bless our Church family in ways great and small. Your service is appreciated.

John Addison Carr

What an amazing treasure trove awaited Crocky when she lifted the lid of the tin box which was found in the church tower! In it were the notebooks of the Reverend John Addison Carr, relating to his period



of tenure as rector between 1786 and 1835 and which revealed a great deal about both Carr and life in Hadstock at the time.

From Crocky's research, recorded in *Through the Centuries* found in the Parish History section of the Archive, Revd. Carr would seem to be one of the best of Hadstock clerics. It seems some early priests rarely, if ever, put in an appearance in the village and others were pretty disreputable. Henry Shankton in 1314, for instance, was involved in the burning down of Lady Blanche's house and in 1589, Mr. Bame, a Hadstock curate, appeared in court accused of all sorts of misdemeanours, including bigamy and forging his ordination papers.

Carr, by contrast, cared for his parishioners and, as he was also a magistrate and acted as Lord of the Manor, (since Hadstock's resided elsewhere), was deeply involved in village matters. In 1792 he even created a census of the village inhabitants. Carr oversaw charities for the poor, kept meticulous records of donors and receivers, and frequently made up any shortfall in funding. He appeared to be egalitarian and fair-minded as evidenced by his dealings with tithes, and, later, the Inclosure process.

In the Landscape/Farming section of the Archive, Part 2 of the series, *Landscape History Of Hadstock Parish 1777-2020*, by Richard Dolby and Rick Albrow, shows the changes to the parish after the Inclosure Act.

Studying this fascinating presentation, you can see that suddenly, Hadstock Common, where the villagers had always had grazing rights, along with other seasonal grazing areas, had been lost to them. This, and other effects of the Inclosure Act must have caused considerable turmoil for Carr's parishioners.

There is much more to discover about the Revd. Carr and other Hadstock clergy in *Through the Centuries* but if you wish to see and read the contents of that tin box you will have to visit the Essex Record Office.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

www.hundredparishes.org.uk

I make no apology for talking again about walking routes. During school holidays, they can provide a framework for family outings and also a slightly structured opportunity for children who like an adventure on their own or with friends.





A hundred local walk descriptions on <u>www.hundredparishes.org.uk</u> can be freely downloaded and printed. They offer outings throughout the Hundred Parishes and for distances from 1 mile to 17 miles. If you have access to the railway network, many of our walks start and finish from stations; all these have been reviewed in 2022 and descriptions

updated or expanded to talk more about what can be seen along the way. Hundred Parishes walks are certainly not the only routes available; our area is

particularly rich in footpaths and bridleways and anyone with an Ordnance Survey Explorer map can devise their own routes. A number of long-distance trails offer challenges that will take more than a single day. These trails knit together established rights of way and are often well signposted, with maps or descriptions available from Tourist Information Centres, bookshops or online.



The Walks section of our website provides links to other walk routes and walking groups, while specific organised walks appear in the What's On section of the website.

When exploring our lovely countryside, please be sure to follow the Countryside Code. I summarise a few points that are mainly common sense:

Respect everyone • leave gates and property as you find them • be nice, say hello • keep to marked paths.

Protect the environment • take your litter home • keep dogs under control and in sight • pick up your dog's poo • do not disturb wildlife.

Finally, be prepared for the English weather with layers of clothing, rainwear, sunglasses, sun cream and sun hat. Enjoy !

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


Pension Credit

Lots of people who are entitled to Pension Credit aren't claiming it - often simply because they don't know about it. Pension Credit gives you extra money to help with your living costs if you're over State Pension age and on a low income and is <u>separate from your state pension</u>. Getting Pension Credit means you could also qualify for other financial support, such as Housing Benefit, a free TV licence and other means-tested benefits. You can claim Pension Credit online, over the phone or by post and will qualify for a higher amount if you're severely disabled or a Carer.
