

Parish Church of St Botolph's RECTOR'S LETTER - REV'D JEREMY TREW – OCTOBER 2022 Jeremy writes:

2022 has been a difficult year for many reasons: The lasting reach of Covid; the first major war in Europe since 1945; rapidly rising prices; shortages of everything, apart from shortages; an excruciatingly slow response to the growing climate and environmental threats; and, rapidly falling trust in our government and the democratic process.



A new, though bleakly familiar, government has been formed and must plan how to respond to all this. Faith is tested. We also come to that time when leaves on the trees brown and fall. Our American cousins call this season the Fall, and that is how it was once known in this country too. I am writing this, sitting in St Mary's Church. People are coming and going; lighting candles, sitting, praying, remembering. It is the morning after the announcement of the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, and feelings are somewhat numbed. Few of us have been here before, and no-one is quite sure what the future holds. When Autumn approaches, trees withdraw rich resources from their leaves to be stored, ready for the spring. The leaves are their waste, and must fall, be let go of and be recycled into the soil. It is necessary and it is good. Queen Elizabeth was a faithful, Christian servant who kept what seemed an almost impossible promise made when she was just 21 to give her years in public service. Whatever our opinions of the benefits of Monarchy (and the Bible sees it as a mixed blessing) Queen Elizabeth was an outstanding public servant. For her now, the work is done. In faith we believe that she has entered into eternal rest in the presence of the King of Kings. Well done, good and faithful servant. In faith we believe that death is not the end, merely life's Autumn. All that is good is withdrawn, and the leaf, its work done, falls to the ground. The goodness, whether it is the Queen's, or yours, or mine, will rise again in the Spring, full of Easter promise, for there is resurrection hope for all of creation. So please pray for King Charles III. He has a difficult act to follow, although, with God's help...

The Archbishop of York's words on the announcement of the Queen's death:

In 2014, Her Majesty remarked,

"Christ's example has taught me to seek to respect and value all people of whatever faith or none."

The Queen's gift to engage with everyone whom she met and the ability to make them feel at ease was a remarkable skill and one which showed a deep connection to the people she served and a desire to live out Jesus' teaching. On the occasions I had the pleasure of meeting Her Majesty, I can testify to the warmth and joy she brought to every occasion. But most of all, it was the resolute reality of her faith that struck me powerfully. In Her Majesty's first Christmas broadcast, ahead of her Coronation she asked the nation, whatever their religion, to pray that God would give her wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promise she would be making and to faithfully serve God and us all the days of her life.

That is most definitely a prayer that has been answered. Her service to our nation and Commonwealth has been exemplified by her devotion to her duty, which has always been offered with joy. Underpinning this has been her deep faith in God and in her we have witnessed God's faithfulness at work. Her Majesty leaves a remarkable legacy which not only lives on in this country, but stretches across the Commonwealth and the rest of the world. Her desire to bring people together and use her role to build up communities and wider society has been a cornerstone of her reign. Do join me in praying for members of the Royal Family over the coming weeks as the God who sustained Her Majesty throughout her life, guides them and brings them comfort. Above all, we pray also for our new King in the responsibilities that now rest upon him. The Queen was not shy in speaking of her faith and the hope and strength she found in Jesus Christ. At the heart of the good news of God is that through the death and resurrection of his son Jesus, the promise of new and eternal life is offered to us all. This belief, this hope, sustained our Queen and as she rejoices in that promise fulfilled so we too can draw comfort and hope from it. Many of us will struggle to imagine the life of our nation without the Queen. Her constancy and faithfulness has been deeply reassuring in a world that has

changed so much. We give thanks for the Queen's example, devotion and huge achievements. She found stability, perseverance and confidence in Jesus Christ who was the source of her hope and peace. May that also be true for each of us and for our nation; and may our dearly departed Queen rest in peace and rise in glory.

How was the death of Queen Elizabeth II marked in Hadstock?

He will toll six at the start (traditional for the death of a woman) followed by 96 one for each year of her life.

Following the death of our Queen Elizabeth II and as a mark of respect there will be in the church on a table beside the altar a mounted photograph of The Queen and beside it a lighted candle where anyone may come and visit for a quiet time of reflection and prayer. This will remain in place during the period of mourning whilst the church is open.

One of the pleasures of managing the archive website is that from time to time a document, photo or DVD turns up which reveals something new to me about past events and the social history of the Parish. This happened in September when I was given two DVDs and a VHS cassette.

The two DVDs were dated 30 years apart, the first being produced in 1981. In 1979, a BAA proposal to build a new terminal at Stansted Airport and expand passenger numbers to 15 million a year saw concerted action throughout Essex to oppose the planning application. A film, directed by Donald Stewart, was produced by the Hadstock Society which set out to show how the character and social life of those villages under the proposed flight path and stacking areas was potentially threatened.



The Society ran several events to finance the production, and various aerial shots were taken using a helicopter, courtesy of the Vesty family. The film was accepted and presented as evidence in the Public Inquiry which was held in Quendon in June 1982. The Inspector, Graham Eyre, commended the film and later it won the Essex Chronicle Award of the Essex Amenity Societies.

However, the Inquiry approved the BAA planning application in 1983 accepting a big increase in passenger numbers but turned down the need for a second runway. The new terminal was opened in 1991. Although the planning result was not the outcome wanted or expected in Hadstock, the film captures village life here 40 years ago in a charming and delightful way. It is now on the archive website.

The second DVD shows a street party in Hadstock held on a sunny day on the Green on April 29th, 2011. Photographed and edited by Harry Villiers, this is also now in the archive in the Events section. It is a lovely, happy video capturing the village celebrations on the occasion of the marriage of Prince William and Kate Middleton. A T-Rex soundtrack accompanies 5 minutes of pictures.



The VHS tape concerns the ancient North door at St Botolph's. It shows the door being taken off its hinges in July 2003 and placed on the church pews by experts who then took core samples for analysis by dendrochronology. They dated the oak door planks between 1040AD and 1070AD. This video will need some editing before uploading to the website.





<u>Village Pond Clearance – Walden Road</u>

Once again, an intrepid team of pond clearers has been in action, this time after a passage of a number of years at the pond on Walden Road at the top of Carters Lane. The whole pond and its surrounding area were choked, particularly with brambles, elder and blackthorn.

Everyone rose to the challenge to clear this and allow in light but also to provide proper access to the off-road water that fills the pond during periods of meaningful rainfall. This work was after a near drought period and it is gratifying to see the pond now filled with water.

For your information, whilst a considerable amount of undergrowth was removed provision was made for local wildlife by building protective piles of dead wood as cover for their continuing presence.

Do take the opportunity to glance at the results of what has been achieved as you pass by. The accompanying photograph shows what we did and who it was undertook the work – not forgetting Keith Nuttall the photographer. 

- the population for the East of England rose by 8.3%, the largest of any region

- Uttlesford rose by 14.9%, 4th largest in the East

- population of Uttlesford in 2021 was 91,300 ranked 265th in England out of 309 authorities. Up 17 places.

- Cambridge increased by 17.6%

- population density in Uttlesford was about 1 per football pitch. The 6th least dense area in the East.


- - there was a 36.3% increase in the 65 and over group.


population change by age group in Uttlesford

Please check your boundaries, and deal with any problems. Hadstock Parish Council


Hadstock Golf day 2022

Don't Forget Gaia at Chelmsford Cathedral

Between 12 and 30 October, Chelmsford Cathedral will be hosting the stunning 'Gaia' artwork when it comes to Essex for the first time.

Measuring six meters in diameter and created from 120dpi detailed NASA imagery of the Earth's surface, 'Gaia' provides the opportunity to see the planet in its entirety as it slowly revolves in the nave of Chelmsford Cathedral, accompanied by a surround-sound composition by BAFTA award winning composer Dan Jones.

It will be suspended, two metres up, giving visitors an opportunity to see the earth as astronauts see it from space and will fill the nave of Chelmsford Cathedral. Artist Luke Jerram hopes that visitors will be inspired, seeing our planet in a new way and that the installation will give people an opportunity to reflect on its vulnerability.
