Parish Church of St Botolph's RECTOR'S LETTER - REV'D JEREMY TREW – SEPTEMBER 2022



Jeremy writes I don't know what your experiences were, but at my school careers advice was rather useless. The best bit of advice I ever received was at a family get-together for my father's side of the family. Everyone there was either a teacher or a chartered accountant (remember – no-one chooses their family). Their advice was; "Jeremy, whatever you do in life don't become a teacher or an accountant." It seemed like good advice and I took it. August must be a blessed relief

for teachers. At long last they've come to the end of a long academic year, and they have earned every minute of the break they're enjoying. Though, it is a relative break, as time off from children does not mean time off from preparation, paperwork and the like. Also, for many, it is not the profession they joined: Children now face examinations almost from starting school to satisfy the neurosis of a control society; That very same society also demands that schools take up many of the basic educational tasks that were once the responsibility of society itself and especially the parents. The culture of the Bible, and particularly the Old Testament, viewed children as one of God's greatest blessings, an unmerited gift whose existence blessed the whole of society in turn. With such a belief hovering in the background it is not surprising that the nurture and care of those children was seen as a shared responsibility, and not just the task of parents, or preferably qualified professionals. This is part of the reason that I value Church and other faith schools. Their existence demonstrates that the nurture of children is more than merely a devolved responsibility, but is fundamental to the human task, just as faith is fundamental to human meaning. Maybe we can learn from this: To look at the tasks that others do and recognise that our welfare is in part dependent on their labour, and theirs on ours; And, to accept that this gives us a mutual responsibility one-for-the other. Maybe then we will not be so ready to offload our responsibilities on other people, but will be more willing to face the needs of our society collaboratively. So; thank you to all in our community who, in one way or another, help nurture our children. May you have a refreshing break. Thank you also to all who, through their work and volunteering, bless our Church family in ways great and small. Your service is appreciated.



One pleasurable autumn task is the harvesting of ripened fruits from trees in your own garden. For most of us, our cooking apple



will be a Bramley's Seedling and the dessert apple an Essex-bred Discovery or a Cox's Orange Pippin. Originating from central Asia, apples are incredibly varied with at least 2,000 named varieties! There are 150 named varieties in the gardens at Audley End.

In the 19th century the skilled horticulturalists at the Rivers Nursery at Sawbridgeworth bred and propagated many varieties of fruit trees, including the prolific Czar plum and Conference pear, both of which are still available today. The Conference pear features in Great Chesterford's 21st-century community orchard.

For commercial reasons, the range available from modern plant nurseries is limited to a few easy-to-grow varieties. However, hidden away in forgotten corners of long-established gardens within the Hundred Parishes there will be specimens of heritage varieties of orchard trees. If you have a flavoursome, but unidentified, variety, then the team at the East of England Apples and Orchards Project would be delighted to hear from you.



Help is available if you are struggling to pay your bills

Firstly - check your benefit entitlements. You might be able to claim benefits or increase your current benefits if you're:

- of working age and on a low income
- sick or disabled
- of State Pension age and on a low income
- a carer
- responsible for children

You can use an online benefit calculator to check you are receiving all the benefits you are entitled to – it only takes 10 minutes. You can find a link on our website. If you don't have internet access or need some extra help, our advisers can carry out a benefit check for you.

Help from the government. The government will give every household in Great Britain £400 off their electricity bill. This is called the **Energy Bills Support Scheme**. You don't need to do anything to get the money and you won't have to pay it back.

You'll get the £400 in 6 instalments starting from October 2022. You'll get:

- £66 in October and November
- £67 in December, January, February and March

Gaia at Chelmsford Cathedral



Between 12 and 30 October, Chelmsford Cathedral will be hosting the stunning 'Gaia' artwork when it comes to Essex for the first time.

Tickets to see 'Gaia' will go on sale from 1st September

Measuring six meters in diameter and created from 120dpi detailed NASA imagery of the Earth's surface, 'Gaia' provides the opportunity to see the planet in its entirety as it slowly revolves in the nave of Chelmsford Cathedral, accompanied by a surround-sound composition by BAFTA award winning composer Dan Jones.

It will be suspended, two metres up, giving visitors an opportunity to see the earth as astronauts see it from space and will fill the nave of Chelmsford Cathedral. Artist Luke Jerram hopes that visitors will be inspired, seeing our planet in a new way and that the installation will give people an opportunity to reflect on its vulnerability.

Next Course: London through Literature 1 for 10 weeks. Starts 27.09.22 Course Description: London is a fictional place. That is, as one of the most written about places in fiction, much of what many people think about London has been created by the imagination of writers. We will discuss the ways writers have used real places and re-created them for their own ends, giving us all a much deeper and richer, multi-layered view of our capital city. The course will be thematic rather than chronological (although covering several centuries of writing), looking at the importance of pre-conceived ideas and first impressions and how work, the legal profession, crime and punishment and entertainment and pleasure in London have all been portrayed, with the lines between fiction and reality often becoming seriously blurred.
