

RECTOR'S LETTER - REV'D JEREMY TREW DECEMBER 2022



On the wall of a house near the Market Square in Safffron Walden is a small plaque. It reads: "On this spot in 1834 nothing happened. "It's not true. I know.

Round about 2022 years ago in a quiet backwater of the Roman Empire nothing happened either. And that's also not true. Well, kind off.

Certainly nothing happened that made the front pages of all the papers (if they'd had newspapers in those days). And if a few people were interested in the events that began to unfold at that time, for the most part they kept fairly quiet about it. No-one slipped a brief note to Rome, warning them of what was to come. Even when a strange group of foreigners turned up at Herod's Court, we're told the initial response was, "Oh yea, there's something written about that somewhere in Micah."

The significance of that first Christmas was only understood much later on. At the time it was, for most, just another day. Even for those who were involved, the birth of a baby was nice, but not exactly rare. If the child survived infancy they might just begin to become interesting, but that was still a way off. An ordinary couple had a child, and they probably were not the only ones. Some shepherds caused a bit of a kerfuffle, but no-one paid that sort any attention. The wise men may not have arrived for a couple of years.

Heaven, it would seem, was found in the ordinary. That's often where it is found today. This Christmas heaven will be found in a person giving you a smile and a bit of space in a busy Christmas shop. Heaven will be found in a children's nativity play, performed with a great deal of commitment, but perhaps a little less skill. Heaven will be found in the recognition that the giver is more important than the gift. All of that is important, and all of that is wonderful. *Continued* 

#### Rector's letter continued

Yes, heaven will also be found in beautifully crafted carol services, and exquisitely thought-through gifts, but at the heart of the Christmas message is this simple idea: That God breaks through into this world, not so much into the great and majestic things, but into the ordinary lives lived by ordinary people. You and I are of interest to God, and in a way that might astound us.

When, after the life of Jesus, the message of this Nazarene Carpenter began to spread, part of its power was the audacious idea that God was on the side of the ordinary. In a world where great power was held by a few, who seemed less and less accountable every passing year, this was good news indeed.

In God's new economy there are no ordinary people, and there are no ordinary days. You would be very welcome to celebrate that at your local church this Christmas, in ways ordinary and extraordinary.

We do not want that: please therefore give me a call on 01223 892746 or 07776 230161 and I'll happily talk through everything, no holds barred.



## I PREDICT A RIOT!!! THE HADSTOCK BREAD RIOT OF 1795

The Community Archive contains a 'deposition' made at Littlebury by one Thomas Smith, baker of Linton, who came to deliver bread to Hadstock in November 1795. "He went as he usually does to Hadstock ... with a quantity of bread, about 60 quartern and half quartern loaves at which he intended to leave 20 or so at a shop in Hadstock".

**NOTE:** A quartern loaf was a loaf of bread weighing 4 pounds, often cut into quarters for sale.

Bread was a staple food in the 1700s, especially for the poor. People were suspicious of millers and bakers giving short weights, and they were accused of holding back flour and bread to inflate prices, preferring to sell to London markets and the military for greater profit

Thomas was met in the street by "several persons, women and children, upwards of 40 he supposes". Alice, wife of John Swan, labourer, grabbed his horse and asked if he "had fallen in his price of Bread". When he replied that he had no orders from the millers to 'fall' Alice Swan said "By God, if you don't fall you shall not leave any Bread in the Town". Thomas was then offered a price of 8d a quartern loaf, which he refused. The crowd said that Mr Buck Smoothy, the Head Farmer, had told them that the market price was 9d a loaf and if the baker refused this price, then they could not be hurt if they took the bread away.

**NOTE:** Local people in East Anglia in particular, surrounded by fields of grain, didn't react well to high prices. Local mobs seized grain stores and flour mills and sold the produce themselves at 'reasonable' prices. The British Government were nervous of dissent and suppressed it, mindful of the French Revolution and unrest in Ireland.

"Several persons then about him took several of the Loaves off his Pads". Thomas said that if they gave him the bread back, they could have the bread at their own price. However, when he counted the bread, there were 2 quartern loaves and three half quartern loaves missing.

#### **Bread Riot continued**

Thomas said that he had seen **Jane Brown** of Hadstock, a singlewoman, take some loaves off his pad and suspected *"that she had secreted them"*. On being challenged, she *"owned it and fetched back three half Quartern Loaves"*. The loaves were delivered to the people around him at 9d a Quartern, the price they had fixed, except for the two missing Quartern loaves.

**NOTE:** Matters came to a head in 1795 with a combination of poor harvests and Napoleonic trade blockades, which led to rising and volatile prices for wheat and bread. The bread riots of 1795 and 1796 spread throughout Britain.

Thomas then said that he had seen **Sarah**, the wife of Thomas **Bye** labourer, take a quartern loaf and not return it. On going home "he met her in the Road between Linton and Hadstock when she offered to pay for the Loaf which he refused".

**NOTE**: There were food riots in Saffron Walden in July 1795. The Mayor asked Lord Howard of Audley End House to use his influence to secure military help and 50 dragoons were sent into the town. The ringleaders were sent to Chelmsford, another was bailed and several escaped. 32 extra constables were sworn in to keep order and the dragoons left within the month.

This was only a few months before the Hadstock Riot, so the villagers would have been aware of the possible consequences.

Thomas "verily believed that if he had not complied with selling his Bread at a reduced price that the persons then assembled about him in a riotous Manner would have taken all his Bread".

#### The Villagers ...

We have a record of the parishioners living in Hadstock in 1792, just 3 years before the riot, compiled by the Rector, Reverend John Addison Carr. He created another list in 1807 and added notes to both.

Alice (who took hold of the baker's horse) had married John Swann in July 1794, the year before the riot. Their children included John (born September 1794), James, Anne (b. 1795?), Mary and Sarah. Newly married, Alice had at least two babies to feed in 1795.

#### **Bread Riot continued**

#### More Villagers

**Buck Smoothy** (the head farmer who advised on what the villagers could reasonably do) was married to Mary with a young family at the time of the riot. Buck and Mary went on to have at least eleven children and lost a child to smallpox. There were several deaths in the village noted from smallpox during this period.

Jane Brown (who took loaves and 'secreted' them) was 20 in 1792 and living at home with her parents, brother and sister. Her sister Elizabeth is shown as being married to Thomas Smith of Linton (Baker) in November 1793. She was the baker's sister in law!

Sarah Bye (who held onto a loaf ...) was married to Thomas Bye Jnr. They had at least ten children in 1792. Sarah and Thomas didn't appear in the 1807 list, but four of their children remain living together, with two others married in separate homes with children.

#### **50** years of the Hadstock Society



In November this year, the Society celebrated its 50th anniversary. It was formed in 1972 following a village meeting of 56 Hadstock residents in which the background to the formation and function of Local Amenity Societies was explained by Mr J Maitland, Chair of Henham Society and a Rural District Council member.

He noted that people were more conscious of their environment, were concerned about imposed large scale housing developments and bad design and wanted to influence local and regional council views on amenities in general. Hence the rapid growth in the number of Amenity Societies in England over the previous 10 years.

In the discussion, some residents saw little requirement for a Society which worked alongside the Parish Council but had no executive powers. However, the majority at the meeting were in favour due to the increasing Government pressures on new large scale house building and the fact that County planners had little knowledge of local issues and residents' views and needed help. The first Society meeting was held on 24<sup>th</sup> November 1972.

Hadstock Green area over 40 years ago, c.1980

Registered with the Civic Trust, the Hadstock Society set out to work for the public benefit and to support and influence the decisions of both Parish and District Councils. A constitution was agreed which followed Civic Trust guidelines. The Society's aims were to stimulate public interest in the Parish, ensure high standards of planning and architecture, and



conserve, protect and develop features of historical and public interest.

The Society planned to signal and recommend the best solutions for Hadstock when faced with large scale environmental problems, such as noise pollution from aircraft, heavy lorry traffic, and large housing developments.

It would assist the Parish Council in making Hadstock's views known to the rather remote County Council decision makers in Chelmsford and give informed opinions on local planning and amenity issues.

This article takes a look at the Society's work over the 50 years. Based mainly on reading the minutes of Committee meetings and AGM reports, and with helpful clarifications from Patricia Croxton-Smith (Crocky), the first elected secretary of the Society, I have focused on the Society's main achievements in each of the five decades.


#### 1972-1982

The first executive committee, under Chairman, Ron Amsden, set out to determine the priorities of residents through a village survey. A plan was developed which dealt with conservation matters, such as landscape, historic buildings, footpaths, trees, ponds, botany, hedgerows, and with planning issues, including village development limits, buildings, water drainage, and electricity supply.

The survey and resulting plan, directed by Donald Stewart, was discussed with the Parish Council, the Rural District Council and Essex County Planners. The Society became responsible for updating the Hadstock listed building information and supported the Parish Council when it applied for Hadstock to become a conservation area. A map was produced in 1974 showing the village building development envelope and proposed conservation area and was approved with modifications by the Rural District Council in 1976. This became the key reference

document for future planning recommendations by the Parish Council until 1984, when some revisions were proposed and agreed.

All Amenity Societies were able to receive copies of local planning applications from 1977 onwards, and so, alongside the Parish Council, the Society became an Uttlesford Planning consultee, a position which is still holds.

In 1973, a safe path to Linton was opened alongside the B1052. This is now Len's path named after Len Rowlandson who for many years worked for the Council as a lengths- man on paths, ditches, fences and other Parish land. This was the first successful project completed by the Society following negotiation with local farmer, John Crawley. Later in 1975, a chance meeting between Committee member Lettice Dawson and the Head of Eastern Electricity on a bus led to Hadstock's nest of power lines in the centre of the village being put underground and a large number of wooden poles became available for good causes.

For the first 10 years, the Committee organised a series of open meetings with outside speakers to help develop background knowledge on subjects such as Essex landscape, nature reserves, tree planting and woodland management, listed building issues, and local archaeology. Committee meetings dealt regularly with around 5 Parish planning applications each year, although this increased to nearly 10 per year in the early 1980s.

Major projects were developed to meet requirements at the time, such as, developing the village plan; assisting the Parish Council with the Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977, including gifting by the Society of the Queen's oak tree planted at the corner of Moules Lane; studying Parish footpaths and their legal status; investigating thatched house rating valuations; and opposing the proposed six-fold passenger expansion at Stansted Airport in 1980.

## HADSTOCK CELEBRATES CHRISTMAS 2022
