RECTOR'S LETTER - REV'D JEREMY TREW - APRIL 2023



Jeremy writes...

Dear All The story of Easter is the beating heart of the Christian story. Without its message Christianity is simply a hollow vessel, albeit with good intentions. We follow its story through Holy Week; with acclamation, communion, betrayal, and death as darkness increases, and hope diminishes. Then, the pause; a hiatus, from Friday afternoon, after the Temple curtain separating

God and humanity is torn in two, until just before dawn on the following A breath is held. Disciples hide, waiting for they know Sunday. Then, on the third day, dawn brings resurrection, new light, not what. Easter has come. and new life. It took those early disciples, generations to truly make sense of what had happened that day and all that it meant for them and humanity. I doubt we will ever know the full meaning this side of heaven. But something had changed, and the incarnate God, now represented by the Church on earth, began the centuries long task of revealing the Kingdom and discovering its riches. Christianity spread slowly, but it gradually gained a momentum, as people saw that these Christians were different. They had compassion and a great communal identity that spanned the divides of wealth, culture and gender, and they had a great story to share. That task is not finished yet. God's Church is still discovering more and more of God's grace and what it means to be "Church". And so I invite you to do three things this Holy Week and Eastertide: I. I invite you to enter into the season, through our services and activities that retell and explore its stories. To allow it to shape, reshape, and refresh your faith. This is the call to be disciples. 2. I invite you to respond to the season and the messages it brings. There is a place in God's Church for you, and there are tasks in that Church that you are well suited to carrying out. This is the call to service. 3. I invite you to allow this season to change you, and to wear that change for the world to see. The Church is called neither to follow the culture around it, nor to oppose that culture, but to reflect and live out the teachings of Jesus and the values we derive from the story of Scripture. continued

This is how God's Kingdom is revealed in this world. British culture that has been historically shaped by Christianity, and yet has never been truly Christian. What does it mean to be a Christian today? The answer is only something we can work out together. This is the call to mission. The story of Easter has lost none of its power or hope. I hope and pray that you will enter into it fully in 2023.

PARISH COUNCIL MATTERS

Annual Parish Meeting

This year's Annual Parish Meeting was held on March 17th, a bit earlier than usual due to the upcoming local elections. Eleven parishioners were present together with councillors. The Parish Council chair, Rick Albrow, reported on the year's activities including the Jubilee celebrations held on the Recreation Ground which had been a huge success. The Council continues to encourage improvements to our environment with further heritage fruit trees on the recreation ground and volunteers clearing the ponds on Walden Road and planting hedges. An important part of the Council's role is to scrutinise planning applications and there were 9 this year. The most significant of these was the change of use of The Mill, Yew Tree farmyard, to residential, which the Council objected to. We have seen some improvement on road closures through intervention by residents and the Council through our County Councillor. A number of planned closures were changed to traffic lights. The cost of maintaining our assets and running the Council has, like everything else, gone up resulting in a near 10% increase in the precept. The cost of the Green Skip service alone has increased by 25%.

Cllr John Lockton spoke about the Hadstock Emergency Plan which is being updated (last done over 20 years ago!). A draft will be available shortly and villagers are asked to add any resources such as equipment or skills they possess which could be called upon in the event of an emergency.

Cllr Keith Nuttall talked about traffic and speeding in particular. There followed a discussion on the possible introduction of a 20mph speed limit. Some areas, Wales, parts of Scotland and Northumbria for example, have adopted a wide area policy of lowering the speed limit where safe and practical to do so. Essex however are lagging behind. There is now much evidence (admittedly mostly from built-up areas) that, although it is unrealistic to expect speeds to drop to 20mph, there is a meaningful reduction in speed and accidents. There was a degree of scepticism expressed and issues of enforcement and a 40mph buffer were raised. However, the meeting was generally in favour of supporting the campaign.

Litter Pick 12 people helped with the Hadstock Litter Pick on Sunday 12 March and collected 16 bags of rubbish which were taken away by Uttlesford District Council workers on the Monday morning. – a good result and thank you to everyone who helped.

A new Parish Council will be elected on May 4th. Rick Albrow informed the meeting that after 12 years, 11 of them as Chair, he will not be seeking re-election.

Frozen South Adventure 2022 – the Antarctic

At last, enveloped in a blizzard, we stood on the 7th Continent, the Antarctic. Surrounded by endless snow and sea and buffeted by the howling winds and driving snow - our ship gradually disappearing from view.



Shackleton and Scott we were not – but for a few hours we felt like true intrepid explorers. After the obligatory photo around the Antarctic flag, we managed to stagger and slide for a few 100 metres. It's doubtful that the Weddell seal and a small collection of Gentoo penguins were overly impressed by our heroism! Then followed a breath-taking Zodiac trip back to the safety of the ship in the descending white gloom.

Back on the ship, a few hardy souls celebrated

reaching the Antarctic by taking a 'polar plunge' – into the minus 2degree sea - well done Russell

But we are getting ahead of ourselves... In November 2022, by complete coincidence, we were both on the same 19-day Antarctic trip aboard a converted Russian expedition ship, the 'Ocean Adventurer', with the naturalist Mark Carwardine and 100 others. Having flown via Buenos Aires we boarded at Ushuaia, the most southerly town in the World, against a backdrop of the snow-covered Andes.

Our trip took us from Ushuaia, to the Falklands, then to South Georgia, the Antarctic Peninsula



and then back across the Drake Passage. Each leg involved around 2 days at sea – with many landings via 10-person rubber Zodiacs, all togged up as 'Michelin men' in about 6 layers, plus a bright yellow Antarctic jacket, waterproof trousers, thick gloves, muck boots and a life jacket.

There were many memorable highlights, here are a few...



A wandering Albatross in flight and friend – a standard sized sea bird!

At sea - whales, giant albatrosses and icebergs – the ship was always accompanied by squadrons of sea birds, the most impressive being the wandering Albatross, a giant of a bird with a 3m wing span. Humpback and fin whales were regularly seen – at one point a group of 40 humpbacks surrounded the ship with plenty of fin-slapping and tail breaching. A family of Orcas came and checked us out – and two blue whales passed serenely by. The Antarctic 'wonderland', the truly awesome gigantic icebergs with vivid deep blues within the older ice and the disturbing sound of the ship grinding through extensive ice barriers.

Princess Anne joined us at **Stanley on the Falklands**, laying a wreath at the war memorial. We felt very much at 'home' in Stanley with the red phone/post boxes, the quaint



coloured buildings, the Union Jacks and a fish-andchip lunch with the local Rockhopper beer.

South Georgia is THE place to see wildlife – and it didn't disappoint. Particularly the overwhelming 300,000 King penguin colony at St Andrews Bay – with its contrasting elegant adults and their noisy, demanding, podgy, brown youngsters, who took a shine to trying to eat our boots!

We were kept on our toes by the rather belligerent fur seals, the huge dominating elephant seals protecting their hareem and the ever present predatory skuas.

South Georgia is also the site of Shackleton's grave at Grytviken. This old whaling station is set in an atmospheric cove, with the moving juxta position of seals and birds against the rusting remains of equipment once used to kill them. As is custom, a whisky toast was made to Shackleton and his men. We also yomped the last leg of his journey across South Georgia – delightful in the spring sunshine, but how did he do it in deepest winter after a horrendous journey by boat?

A Rockhopper Penguin



Penguins – thousands of penguins of all sizes, shapes, colours – elegant Kings, bad hairdo Rockhoppers and Macaroni, stone stealing Adelie, haughty Chinstraps and the archetypal Gentoo. They all kindly put up with us gawping and wandering through their colonies.

Finally, we crossed the Drake Passage back to Ushuaia with some trepidation – it didn't disappoint, a major storm led to a roller coaster ride and a memorable Antarctic 'goodbye'.

We were greeted by glorious sun and blue skies as we pulled back alongside the wharf at Ushuaia – precisely 19 days after we departed.

It was a wonderful expedition – and everyone agreed, one not to miss.

And standing in that Antarctic blizzard will remain with us for ever.

50 Years of the Hadstock Society

2002-2012

The 2000s saw several major archaeological projects initiated and completed. In 2003, samples were taken from the north door for dating with dendrochronology by Oxford University, following a grant from the Society of Antiquaries, and showed a date range 1040-1070. A film was produced of the procedure.

The following year, and initiated by the Hadstock Society, a major seminar on the history of St Botolph's was held in the church and attended by many experts, including Dr Warwick Rodwell, who had carried out an extensive church floor excavation in 1974.

This seminar led to a 2005 geophysical survey and archaeological dig in two nearby fields, funded by the Society and won through grants. Carried out by the Essex County Council Field Archaeology Unit and assisted by voluntary help from residents, young and old, significant numbers of prehistoric, Roman, Saxon and medieval artefacts were collected, classified and archived.

A booklet 'Why Hadstock?' was produced describing the dig and given to every resident.




The dig was followed in 2007 and 2010 with field walks by Society members on a grid system laid out in Bantons Field, followed by professional classification of finds. All the artefacts from the dig and the walks remain in the possession of the Society, but despite these various studies, there are still questions on the origins of St Botolph's church. However, the evidence of an early church dating to before 900AD found in Rodwell's excavations was reinforced in 2018 by the results of a carbon dating analysis of mortar taken from the lowest flint layers of St Botolph's south nave wall. This amazing result is still to be followed up with more research.

A new 5-year Parish Plan was developed by the Parish Council in 2007 based on a questionnaire to all households and views expressed by residents at meetings. Covering issues including housing, employment, traffic and green issues, it set out revised Planning guidelines for considering new planning applications. Society members were on the steering group and supported the Parish Council throughout the development of the plan.

Planning applications in this 10-year period were being reviewed by the Society as usual, typically 10-15 each year, and a detailed objection was lodged against a new wind farm of 8 turbines planned in Linton Parish, just west of the Hadstock Parish boundary. The proposal was eventually withdrawn. Occasional speaker meetings and outside visits continued to be organised and Society's membership remained around 70 in this decade

continued.

In 2010, Rick Albrow and a team of volunteers completed a Society project to record the inscriptions on all the memorials in St Botolph's church and churchyard. This contains the names, dates and ages of many Hadstock families and the location and a photograph of each memorial. It is now accessible by the public on the Parish website.

As the weather warms, we look forward to an abundance of flowers offering food for



bees, hoverflies and butterflies. A report by the Essex Wildlife Trust indicates that such sightings may be much reduced. During 2022, members of the Trust participated in the UK citizen science Bugs Matter Survey, recording 'bug splats' on vehicle number plates to monitor flying insect abundance. The numbers of insects recorded on 277 journeys across Essex suggested that insect numbers have

declined by 60% since 2004.

Bumblebees

This is a worrying trend as it has implications for the survival of many other organisms. The majority of plants rely on insect pollinators to set seed including wild and garden flowers and three quarters of our food crops. Many song-birds feed on insects, and seed eaters such as skylarks and house sparrows nourish their young on insects. The reasons for this decline are complex, but as most arable crops are grown without any weeds this reduces the variety of food supplies for caterpillars, aphids and bugs.



Green Grasshopper

Fewer flowers mean less food for bees, adult butterflies and moths. Fortunately, many insect species are resilient, and we can help with the survival of some. I encourage you to plant up your gardens with native hedgerow shrubs, a tree or two



and install a bug hotel as these provide many habitats where insects can over-winter. Accepting flowery lawns and planting a wide selection of flowers is not only attractive to us but provides nourishment for an abundance of insects too.

There are many helpful guides to creating a wildlife garden; the RHS website is helpful as is Gardening for Wildlife by Adrian Thomas published by Bloomsbury in 2017.
