RECTOR'S LETTER - REV'D JEREMY TREW - MARCH 2023



Jeremy writes... This month we celebrate Mothering Sunday. A bit like harvest it's never been an official Church festival, rather one adopted because of local popularity, and they're maybe the best sort. But what will we be celebrating? Mothers of course; ours specifically, and motherhood in general. But what does that mean? Motherhood and the family mean very different things to different people. For some it is the idealised view of a wife and mother managing the home and raising the children. For others it

is quite different.

Mothering Sunday has its origins in something older: 'Laetare Sunday'. Laetare comes from the Latin for the first word of the traditional prayer for the day: 'Rejoice'. It is also known as 'Refreshment Sunday', and was a day when people who had given something up for the Christian fast of Lent (like sweet foods) were allowed to 'break their fast' and have a little of whatever they were missing. And in some places this Sunday is called 'Bright Sunday' or, in others, 'Holy Humour Sunday'.

Humour is found all through the Bible, from beginning to end. For example, in the book of Genesis God tells Abraham and Sarah that they are going to have a child. Sarah is too old to have a child and when she hears what God has said she laughs. This laughter is so important that they call their child Isaac, as the name means 'laughter'. Isaac is one of the great forefathers of the Jewish faith and Sarah, one of the great foremothers of the faith, is the one who laughed.

I suspect that most mothers would go mad if they couldn't sometimes laugh at life's quirks and misunderstandings. The misunderstandings of families and children, if treated with a sense of humour, can make a family joyful and a good deal less stressful. So here goes...

A mother was explaining to her young children how they should behave during a church service. She asked them, 'Why is it important to be quiet in church?' Her bright little daughter said, 'Because people are sleeping.'

A mother had been teaching her three-year-old son the Lord's prayer. For several evenings at bedtime, he would repeat after his mother the lines from the prayer. Finally, he decided to go solo. His mother listened with pride as he carefully recited each word, until he got to: 'Lead us not into temptation,' he prayed, 'but deliver us from e-mail.'.

Amen to that one!

Laughter is an essential ingredient in our family lives (even if you didn't find those jokes funny). So don't come to church morose and full of penitence this Mothering Sunday. Instead put on your best smile and bring your laughter with you. Have a blessed Lent.

We now cross our fingers for sufficient rain so they can establish themselves! John Lockton


PARISH COUNCIL MATTERS

<u>Village Litter Pick</u> Our annual foray onto the verges and into the ditches to retrieve other people's litter will this year be on

Yellow vests, bags and litter pickers will be provided.

Each year we have found evidence of fly tipping, particularly in the ditches at the bend in Bartlow Road and that brings me to the next point:



Instead of promoting recycling, Essex have decided to introduce a mandatory booking system for our local centre. This is without any local consultation and without evidence of congestion or queuing causing safety concerns. A trial elsewhere resulted in a 13% increase in reported fly tipping. Martin Foley, our County Councillor, has voiced his strong opposition to this mad idea.

At its meeting on 23rd February the Parish Council co-opted David Johnson who will be a valuable member of the Council.

Our Heritage Orchard

With some new trees planted this year we now have 13 varieties of apple, 2 pears and 2 gages on the Recreation Ground. All of these varieties originated in the East of England and the trees have been supplied by the East of England Apples and Orchard project who maintain a collection of heritage varieties.

Apples: Red Victoria, Huntingdon Codlin, Green Harvey, Barnack
Beauty, Murfitt's Seeding, Sturmer Pippin, Lord Peckover, Dr Harvey, Chivers
Delight, New Rock Pippin, Rivers Early Peach, Bedford Pippin, Eros

Pears: Improved Fertility, Beurre Bedford

Gages: Willingham Gage, Cambridge Gage Here's one example:

Dr Harvey - Culinary apple. First recorded in Essex in 1629 and believed to be named after Dr. Gabriel Harvey, a former Master of Trinity College, Cambridge, who

retired to Saffron Walden. A large and handsome goldenyellow apple with some scruffy russetting. Cooks to a sweet puree with only a little acidity. Has good mildew resistance. Pick late Sept and use from Sept to Dec

Scrumping will be encouraged once the trees have grown a bit and are reliably bearing fruit. They suffered during the drought last year and it remains to be seen how they will recover. Please do water them if we again have drought, there is a water barrel close by.



50 Years of the Hadstock Society By Richard Dolby



1992-2002

Over the next 10 years, the Society continued its regular review of local planning applications, usually less than 10 a year. Membership numbers grew to over 90.

Several open meeting talks and outside visits were arranged annually, and the Society began to archive the history of Hadstock by creating a village photograph and document collection, which was exhibited for the first time in 1997 at a Heritage exhibition in the village hall, part of the Civic Trust's National Heritage weekend.

In this period, there was an exhibition of field finds by local farmer and metal detectorist, the late John Barker, several historical talks including one on Hadstock's 1805 Enclosure Act, and a display of past and present photographs of St Botolph's church at an English Heritage Open weekend.

At the 1997 AGM, the silver anniversary of the Society was celebrated with a special cake, in the presence of most of the founder Committee members, who reminisced on the previous 25 years of Society activities.


A Society scrapbook of village events and newspaper cuttings was started in 1998 and continued for 6 years. Two such scrapbooks are in the Society's archive and are available for browsing and research.

The Society then commenced a major new project to celebrate the 2000 millennium, the production of a 'Domesday' book of Hadstock Parish featuring residents and their houses, along with other information about the Parish.

It applied for and won a £5000 Millennium grant, and the book was successfully printed and distributed free to every household. The booklet proved a valuable local document and was consulted regularly by residents over the next 20 years.

The cold start to the year coincided (of course ...) with Central Heating problems. After several visits, the engineers eventually identified the problem in the Oil-Fired system and rectified it - we'd like to thank Hall users and customers for their forbearance during those chilly weeks. Fortunately, the participants at the Burns Night Event in January, brushed aside the inclement weather and the brief surprise electrical black-out, to have a splendidly successful evening. Thanks again to Stuart, Siobhan and their helpers. (UK Power Networks replaced their faulty external cable two days later). As already highlighted, the new Bar, (bought thanks to a generous donation from 'The Friends of the Kings Head') is now in place and was put to full use for the first time at the 'Artists in Exile' charity fund-raising Race Night event in February. Maintenance work on the Hall internally and externally continues - (it never seems to end) The entrance hall light has been replaced and re-sited (due to mice chewing cables), and external work on the Hall front and side entrances has started. This latter work, funded by grants, is being carried out, as a result of comments from Hall users, to enhance safety at the front of the Hall and provide step-free and improved access for all to the areas at the back.

The popular Quiz evening is returning on March 18^{th} – please book your tables soon – and the Committee is considering starting a season of 'Saturday Breakfast Talks' (some of you may remember them from several years ago in the Pub) – see separate note in this Mag.

The Story of Artists in Exile by Sarah Woods

as seen on hadstock info on 13 February. I thought you would like to read this. Sue -Ed

Artists in Exile began at the start of the Ukraine war, when a curator from Kyiv asked if I could help Ukrainian artists come to the UK. Of course I said yes. Not quite knowing how to do that.

A small group of six of us, volunteers, friends and mostly artists – set up a bank account, registered as a not-for-profit organisation and thought that if we could change the lives of 4 or 6 people, that would be amazing.

We're now supporting 70 Ukrainian artists and their families, with more visas being applied for and issued each week. We also help people from the LGBTQ+ community, because they often don't get as much help as they should. In reality, we help anyone in need who comes to us and cannot find help elsewhere.

In the last week, we have supported Valya and her 2-year-old son Pavlo to leave Ukraine and come to Todmorden in Yorkshire, we've found sponsors for a mother and her teenage son who are desperate to leave Kyiv, and a young man currently living in a single room with his sister and mother in Germany. We've organised a place for a young pianist, still in Ukraine, to undertake a degree at Birmingham Conservatoire. We've guarantored a house near Huddersfield for two young Ukrainian mothers and their young children to move into. We've brokered tenancy agreements, liaised with universities, helped with student loan applications, set up a volunteering opportunity for a young Ukrainian woman at an animal shelter, attended doctors' appointments, benefits appointments, booked train tickets for a young Nicaraguan asylum seeker to attend his asylum appeal. I could go on.

It's a bigger job than we imagined. And more profound. People put their lives in our hands. Whole lives. Sometimes for a short while. Sometimes for longer.

The story of Artists in Exile continued

Since arriving, our artists have performed at the Royal Albert Hall in London, they've put on concerts in their local areas – one of which was covered on TV – and 4 of them are now working on a Radio 4 Afternoon play. They run art classes and dance classes and bake amazing cakes and they fight for ways to make films and to act and to write and to paint and to dance.

People contact us now from other parts of the world. We are supporting artists from Nicaragua, Iran, Iraq. What we do is limited and imperfect. We are desperate for more sponsors. But we are doing our best. And the coming event will help. The money raised will make so many things possible for people whose lives have been unmade by world events.

The world is a complex place. More complex than it was when we used to think it was a complex place. And when we're faced with complexity, it can make us want to hide away. Artists in Exile has taught me that if we can reach out of that and connect, it helps us as well as those we seek to help.
