The Rector's Letter from the Rev'd Jeremy Trew Jeremy writes...

Dear All

When I go away, be it on holiday or retreat or training course, I look for helpful resources I can carry with me. The advent of the iPad has made that a much easier task as it can hold a vast bank of books, video, music, etc, and is great, as long as the battery doesn't expire. So, with Summer arrived and the

holiday season on the horizon I've dug out an old prayer resource that is easily portable, doesn't require batteries and even a baby can use. Enjoy.

The "handy" prayer resource:

- 1. Your thumb is nearest to you. So begin your prayers by praying for those closest to you. They are the easiest to remember. To pray for our loved ones is, as C.S. Lewis once said, a "sweet duty".
- 2. The next finger is the pointing finger. Pray for those who teach, instruct and heal. This includes teachers, doctors, and ministers. They need support and wisdom in pointing others in the right direction. Keep them in your prayers.

We appreciate that.

Once more, an enormous thank you to Felix and Laura at Hadstock Hall. Without the support from you both in terms of allowing us the use of your property both on the day, in the run up and after and also for ongoing storage, this Fête would be a shadow of what it is. Let us never forget that.

Finally, therefore, we will make an interim share out 50/50 to the Church Building Fund and the Village Hall of the bulk of this as soon as possible. I'll hold back a small sum to cover any unforeseen contingency.

On a personal note, as you know, this as I told you last autumn is my last leading the team. Everything needs a fresh perspective and my hour is passed. I shall still help if needed and I shall still be Treasurer. We have a Fête that is the envy of others; don't let it pass.

On-going Ukraine conflict creates an appeal from SW Rotary



A dire need for basic food, household, toiletries and health supplies.

A collection for the people of Ukraine will be held by Saffron Walden Rotary on: -

Saturday 15th July from 9.00am until 1.00pm on the

Saffron Walden Common next to the car park.

As the war continues families are losing their homes and possessions and are often without a breadwinner for the family. This creates a need for everyday food items, shoes, clothes, especially underwear, toiletries, all types of personal washing and shampoo items, sanitary towels and sanitary pads. Items for children include nappies for babies and colouring books and school supplies for young children.

The aid which the Rotary Club has been collecting over the last year is delivered to the Felsted based charity UK-Aid who in turn takes it to distribution centres in Moldova and Ukraine for the benefit of refugee and dispossessed families in those countries. Many hundreds of families have been helped, although many more are still in need' says Rotarian project leader John Tapscott.

Cash donations to assist in transportation costs are also accepted and these can also be made at the Rotary collection point in cash or by credit card on the 15th July.

Rotary Saffron Walden is very appreciative of all the support it gets in its many different fundraising efforts.

Remembering Rosamond Hudson

Rosamond moved to Hadstock in 1981 having brought up her family in Upminster. She knew that she had made a good choice to move to somewhere more rural when she was immediately made welcome by the villagers.

During her over 30 years in Hadstock she threw herself into



village life as a member of the Hadstock Society and a parish councillor. For many years she was a bell ringer at St. Botolph's. She helped to establish the Nature Reserve and took part in numerous village fetes and the famous Dig. Her pride and joy was her garden at the Cedar which she converted from an overgrown patch to a much larger and productive area.

Her village friends spanned a number of generations from Hadstock legends such as Jock, Lettice, Hamish and (apologies) Crocky to the children of neighbours such as the Hewletts and Halls who treated her as a surrogate granny.

After leaving Hadstock in 2013 she lived happily by the sea in North Wales still active until the last couple of years when she had to move into a care home.

She died peacefully on 10th June just short of her 96th birthday. Her children had been with her.

Rosamond's daughter Catherine Nield sent this to the Magazine as she was sure that many people would remember her mother from the time, she lived in Hadstock. Catherine also said that Rosamund had an aerial photo of The Cedar on her wall which reminded her of the many happy years she spent there.

Crocky added Rosamond did all sorts of jobs round the village, not only mending things; she cut footpaths that were badly overgrown, oiled the benches round the village etc. She was also very keen on her garden and encouraged wildlife to come to her pond. She was Warden of our Nature Reserve up the Walden Road If anyone mentioned that something wanted doing, we soon found that she had just gone and done it. She was very keen on all wildlife. Rosamond will be remembered fondly by many here.

The Hadstock Society – 50 year Celebration An Evening with 'Crocky' - 10 May 2023



Crocky was in fine form and talked about an agreed set of village photographs, prompted by Richard Dolby the Chair of the Hadstock Society.
Crocky came to the village in 1957 to work with Jock Dawson at White house farm on his research into infertility in cows. Cows were sent from all over the country to take part.

Some arriving by train at Bartlow station. Jock also ran a local scout group mounted on horseback, which helped some of the many disadvantaged young people. These young lads learned much from working with and caring for horses and ponies. Up to 15 in the troop some on horses or ponies borrowed from neighbours. Jock's wife Lettice ran a cub pack too.

Crocky told of having to post off lots of envelopes (reprints of Jock's research wanted all over the world) at the Post Office run by Connie Free, who delighted in the challenge of finding the postage for all the exotic places. This is now Roundhill Cottage on the village green.

Crocky related a tale about when the Hadstock Society had been trying to get the village conservation area designated but were refused by the tangle of overhead wires in the Village. The electricity company had refused to put the wires underground. This changed when Lettice, a new lay reader, met a lay reader from Abington at a meeting who turned out to be the head of Eastern Electricity. The wires soon got put under ground and the Village was designated as a conservation area. *continued*.

Crocky mentioned that when electricity first came to the village, every time there was a thunder storm the electric would go off! Gas did not arrive in the Village until the 1990s!

The Parish Council (Crocky was for some time the Clerk to the Parish Council) had tried to get a weight limit on the road through Hadstock to stop the many heavy lorries coming through the village. The Chair Robin Marks, invited the Chair of the County Highways committee to walk with him down the road to Linton at 5.00pm on a Friday evening. 'The poor man was so frightened by the experience that the weight limit was put in place in no time.' At that time there was no safe route to walk to Linton as we have now in Len's Path,

There were many more stories and the audience packed into the Village hall remained entranced by Crocky's performance, and I think she was delighted by the number there to hear her.



At about 9.00pm Richard brought the evening to the end and Crocky was presented with a plant and a very welcome drink and received a very long round of applause!

Well done Crocky – we are lucky to have you in our Village.



Don't worry, the Village Hall Committee are coming up with an alternative pub night for the village in the Autumn.
