From St Mary's Saffron Walden Parish News Report by Edward Gildea, Eco Team Leader

Eco church has been operating in St Mary's for four years now, as part of the Church of England's goal to reach carbon zero by 2030. Reducing the energy consumption of our cathedral-sized church is still an outstanding challenge, but the PCC has embarked on the exciting process of designing and installing a new, more beautiful and energy efficient lighting system, which will be a significant step forward. **The most important challenge of Eco church, however, is supporting parishioners in reducing their own carbon footprints.**

Huge thanks to all of you who took part in our recent survey! 58 of you took part, which was most encouraging, and the headline results include that 66% of respondents always or frequently cut down on their meat consumption; 78% bought local food in season all or most of the time; 56% considered the environment when buying clothes and a massive 90% mended, repaired or recycled their clothing! Other parts of the survey showed that 73% avoided flying where possible, 83% avoided using their tumble driers and 86% had read articles about the environment and watched TV programmes about it.





Residents living in the countryside of the Hundred Parishes are fortunate that the intrusive sounds of human activities are less when compared to those living within



built up areas close to main roads or railway tracks or beneath regular flight paths. Even within our homes our ears are subjected to a cacophony of sounds: TV or radio programmes, ring tones, the hum of machines, barking dogs or noisy neighbours. Rarely are we surrounded by silence!



Appreciating tranquillity is an essential aspect of being in the countryside, where it should be possible to scan attractive views of verdant landscapes or cloudy skyscapes, hear natural sounds and catch glimpses of wildlife without intrusive background noises.

Evidence gathered over the past 15 years reveals that tranquillity is not just a pleasurable experience but is essential for human health and wellbeing reducing stress levels and lifting spirits.

In the early 1990's concerns were raised about the harmful levels of intrusive noise in daily lives. The Countryside Commission and the Council for the Protection of Rural England worked together to produce an Intrusion Map which highlighted areas that were most affected by human-induced noises. Since then, research has been undertaken by CPRE and others to develop suitable methodology for measuring noise and evaluate the visual impact of developments on landscapes. *continued*

In 2012, tranquillity gained recognition in national planning policy. Now studies are prepared to evaluate Landscape Character Areas and their Sensitivity to Change, and these are included in the reports prepared for Local Plans. They must include appropriate mitigation



measures to help reduce intrusive noise to acceptable levels.

The walk descriptions listed on the Hundred Parishes website provide opportunities to appreciate the tranquillity of this

part of the country, to hear bird song, sense the wind in the trees and view some wonderful rural landscapes.


