The Rector's Letter, from the Rev'd Jeremy Trew Jeremy writes

In the Saffron Walden and Villages Team we will also be noticing some significant changes. At the end of September we said goodbye to John Saxon, and in October we also say farewell to Alex Jeewan. These two have been a great blessing to the Team and will be greatly missed. I will certainly miss them as respected colleagues. I am sure that you will join me in continuing to pray for them as they settle into their respective "pastures new." We must trust that, as God called them to minister here, in calling them away that same God still has plans for us.

In early September we welcomed Hilary Walker to the Team as she was ordained Deacon in Chelmsford Cathedral. At the very end of September, we were also able to celebrate Ella Harris being ordained priest. I am very excited to be able to work with these two as they are both very able, although in different ways. Please note that they are still in training. Their roles are not to fill all the gaps left by John and Alex's departures. Both will be playing a full part in the life of the Team, but only as it serves their training needs.

Bishop Roger has been to meet with Parish Representatives and help us move the recruitment process forward. Archdeacon Robin has also been part of this, although we will also have said goodbye to him at the start of October as he retires. Before he did so he helped me secure the services of Rev Gary Fleming, a final year curate, who will be helping out with Sunday services for a while. Please make Gary feel welcome. And then there are our retired clergy (although simply "not paid" might sometimes be a better title). When I was ordained these wonderful people with their many years of experience were normally called upon for holiday cover or in case of unexpected illness. Now the Church of England is dependent upon them. Sometimes we ask too much of them, especially with the great number of vacancies this Deanery has and is experiencing. Nevertheless, I am most grateful for the way they have stepped forward to keep as many services running as possible.

And then there is you. You are the Church. Well, technically, you and everyone else who gathers together when we meet. The real success of this time of clergy vacancy will truly be down to you, and people like you, who pray and offer services in ways small and great, and who together make old buildings come to life with your worship and love. A vacancy, and vacancies, are an opportunity for the local Church to show what it is made of. I am confident that our local church, in all its manifestations, is well built and on a good foundation.





The Battle of Assandun 1016

A mini conference exploring the history of Assandun and the project to discover it. Essex Record Office, Chelmsford. Saturday 14th October, 10.30 - 12.30

We know quite a lot about the Battle of Assandun (1016) and the building of Cnut's Minster (1020) from the Anglo-Saxon Chronicles and other nearcontemporary sources. However, the location of the battlefield and the Minster remain the subject of debate. Hadstock and Ashdon are strong candidates but there are others too notably Ashingdon in southeast Essex which has long been favoured by some historians.

Richard Dolby and Crocky are taking part in a research project, led by the Battlefield Trust, to examine the evidence in detail. Sub-groups are looking at candidate sites for the Minster and battlefield and tracing possible routes that the two armies would have taken during the course of 1016. A lot of work has been done and the group have been invited to hold a seminar on their findings so far at the Essex Record Office in Chelmsford. Richard will be making a presentation. Thatch has been used as a roofing material for thousands of years. It was once common in rural areas because the material was cheap and readily available. Now, a thatched roof is much more expensive but the skill of the thatcher can

still be seen throughout The Hundred Parishes. A thatcher undertakes a five-year apprenticeship with a master thatcher before becoming a master thatcher himself.

Most properties in the UK use either long straw, wheat reed or water reed. Many thatched properties are listed and when re-thatching is needed there is a requirement to use the same type of material as before.

In medieval times wheat grew to nearly 6 feet tall, while today's modern farming methods produce shorterstemmed wheat and this has



weakened the straw and its longevity. Now specialist growers produce tallerstemmed varieties, grown especially for thatching.



There is some debate about the longevity of a thatched roof. To some extent, life expectancy relates to the material used, but it is also dependent on factors such as pitch, orientation and air circulation. A good thatch will typically last from 20 to 50 years, providing excellent insulation. The ridge, along the top of the roof, will last between 10 and 20 years, so requires more frequent attention.



Traditionally a new layer of material is laid over the seasoned roof; this is called "spar coating". The bundles of straw taken up onto the roof are called "yelms". Twisted hazel sticks known as "spars" or "gads" are used to secure the thatch in place. A thatcher may mark his work by placing a distinctive straw finial on the ridge.

Thatch appears not only on houses. There are several thatched pubs, a thatched church at Duddenhoe End in the parish of Elmdon, and a partly-thatched village hall in Ashdon. Ken McDonald, Secretary

A play called 'Democracy'

If you had been listening to Radio 4 on Sunday afternoon 17 September you would have heard a play by Sarah Woods, who lives in Hadstock. Her play came after a programme called 'Opening Lines' to which Sarah also contributed.



The 'Opening Lines' were from the two volume book 'Democracy in America', written by the French man Alexis de Tocqueville after his visit to America with his friend Gustave de Beaumont in 1830.They wanted to find out about Democracy which they thought would come to all of Europe.

The two travelled 7,000 miles over 271 days visiting 17 states, using horseback, canoe, stagecoach and steamer encountering many difficulties along the way. They met dignitaries and ordinary folk in the places they visited and Alexis kept notes about his meetings, Back home in France he wrote 2 volumes about Democracy in America. The young men were impressed by America. -De Tocqueville was struck by the 'equality of social conditions' Where with there being more equality people can change their positions more easily. He said that any American can prosper by working hard and learning a trade. But having money changes things and makes for inequalities.

In Sarah's play the main character and elderly man set out to find out what people in different places

in the UK thought about Democracy. How he did this I will not tell you in case you would like to listen to it on the BBC Sounds app.

I can recommend the play. It was really interesting and thought provoking and I really liked the main character. We are lucky to have such talented people living in Hadstock. Well done, Sarah not least for reading the 2-volume book before writing your play! Sue - Ed
