

Jeremy writes...

Christmas arrives at the end of this month – you didn't need me to tell you that! If you have children then it has probably been arriving since late September, and even if you don't you couldn't escape the presence of cards and decorations in the shops interestingly juxtaposed with Halloween tat.

Preparing for Christmas can be both harrowing and demanding. There's so much to do, so many lists to check. And then it's Christmas Eve, and half of it not done. A final gargantuan effort!... and then you can flop onto the sofa to watch the last half of the "Sound of Music" and try and work out just how many you've got for lunch the next day.

Christmas requires precisely 10% more preparation than we are able to give to it. But it's worth it, because it is just about the only occasion in the year when we are likely to meet up with so many of our family and friends and take time to spend more than just a few minutes with them. It might seem stressful at times, but normally we conclude it has all been worth it. Preparing well for Christmas is worth it. That's why we have the season of Advent just prior. It is the time when we hear the stories that provide the background to why God bothered to take the not inconsiderable risk of sending his Son into a world that could be brutal and dangerous. Preparation is always an important time, because it allows us to make sense of the celebration that follows.

I once read a psychiatrist's advice on how to survive Christmas, and I pass it on to you as something we have found helpful: Don't overdo the housework – low lighting and candles can hide a multitude of sins (and dust). Get out for some fresh air, even five minutes – it clears your head, reduces tension, and leads to fewer arguments. And remember, if you're the one doing all the entertaining this Christmas, you deserve a break too – get someone else to do the washing-up and relax by spending ten minutes guessing what possessed Auntie Beryl to buy you that ghastly jumper.

Finally, before I close, three ancient laws that are still on the statute books: It is illegal not to go to church at Christmas; It is illegal to drive or ride to church on Christmas Day; It is illegal to have more than three courses for your Christmas dinner. Go on... break the last two, I won't tell! But if you'd like to keep the first you would be most welcome.

Where is Assandun?

A talk by Richard Dolby on Wednesday 6th December 2023



After the AGM of the Hadstock Society which starts at 7.30pm

Invasions of England started around 800AD, and for the next 200 years, armies from Denmark created death and destruction across most regions. In 1016AD, the Danes invaded once more, intent on taking the English crown. The Danish King, Cnut (Canute), succeeded and became King of England, reigning successfully for 19 years. His decisive battle with England's Edmund Ironside, the Battle of Assandun, took place on October 18th somewhere in Essex. The battle site location is the subject of a current Essex wide project supported by Battlefields Trust of Britain. Progress was presented at a public meeting in Chelmsford in October and this talk is a summary. 40,000 Danes settled in the England in the C11th. Do we all have Viking DNA in our blood?

Come and learn the answer.





Who Lived Here Before us?


Most of us are interested in the people who lived in our homes before us, especially if we inhabit an old house, hence the enjoyment of Crocky's excellent, well-attended talk in mid-November. Even those of us living in newer homes are interested in our village's history. Crocky both informed and entertained us, not least us with nuggets such as that the last reputed witch of Hadstock, Mrs Mallows, lived in Beam Ends until she died, aged. It is no wonder that villagers were wary of going up The Causeway!

We have many clues about previous Hadstocians; how they lived and what they used, built or made and the Archaeology and Artefacts section of the Community Archive contains a wealth of such information. A number of posts show photographs of some of the pottery shards and objects either discovered in the 2005 archaeological dig or picked up during field walks on Bantons in 2007 and 2010.



If you were resident in 2005 you will remember the dig as a special event which involved both adult and child volunteers from the village. Some of the finds have been exhibited by the Hadstock Society at recent Fetes. They provide valuable information about our predecessors. There are worked flints and shards of pre-historic pottery. There are shards of fine-ware pots, a hypocaust and tiles from Roman times. So many pieces of

Roman tiles were unearthed that some of us sorting through the Field Walk finds more recently began to regard them as a nuisance rather than valuable evidence of a centrally heated, tiled roofed, Roman Farmstead belonging to a person of wealth and high status living in Hadstock almost 2000 years ago!



Other finds date from later periods and include horse shoes and fragments of a clay pipe. The clay pipe intrigued me. According to the archive it dated from the C17th. Clay pipes were in use from 1680 when tobacco was first brought to this country until the mid C20th. I wondered about the person who

smoked it. Not many Hadstock residents then would have been able to afford the pipe or the new tobacco to smoke in it. Perhaps the smoker lived in one of our oldest, better-quality houses, perhaps the manor, now Hadstock Hall. *continued on next page*

In the Landscape and Farming part of the Archive I could see which houses were possible homes for the clay pipe owner by browsing Part 4 "Houses and the Built Environment" of Richard Dolby's marvellous landscape series.

Here you can view early maps which show houses in existence at different times. The earliest map dates from 1777 and many of the houses shown can be identified by their position, Beam Ends and Hadstock Hall among them.



We are fortunate to possess a wealth of historical evidence, both dug out of the ground or visible above it. Our Church, for example, is a treasure trove with its wealth of physical features displaying its pre-Conquest origins and archaeologists have discovered evidence of an even older stone church beneath it. You can find out more about their work and what they discovered in various posts in the Archaeology and

Artefacts section. To determine the age of the North Door, for example, (now known to be the oldest working door in England) dating by dendrochronology was required. You can view a short video showing the preparation for this process, including the removal of the door. The archaeologists concluded that the date lay between1040 and 1070.

Also visible above ground are the many older village houses which still retain some of their original building materials, such as thatch and wattle and daub, and interior features such as old beams, period windows and inglenook fireplaces that we want to conserve. Now, when there is an urgent need to decarbonise the village to combat climate change, we have to work out how to effectively insulate our heritage homes without compromising on the necessary conservation rules protecting them.
