Parish Church of St Botolph's FEBRUARY 2024

Jeremy writes... Being a Christian isn't always easy. We may have other things we would like to do with our time. We might have good friends who think that going to Church on a Sunday morning is a bit of a strange thing to do. Sometimes religious belief can seem a little at odds with a world built on

rationality (I have issues with this last one, but that's for another month).

The main challenge I have with Christianity is other Christians. Not you, of course, but those other embarrassing ones who say and do things that are just plain silly or stupid, or worse. And here's the challenge for me. I might understandably want to write them off and put a clear distance between myself and their behaviour. I might even want to claim that they are not real Christians. Maybe they are not, but only God alone can call that one. Instead, I must accept that they are my brothers and sisters in Christ: Fellow Christians, albeit not very good ones, at least not by my estimation. Maybe I'm not always a very good Christian myself, at least not by my estimation.

That's difficult. It's far easier to turn your back on those who disappoint or disturb you. And, if you do it right, you can do it in such a way that it leaves you feeling justified and even smugly superior. It's just that does not seem to be Christ's way.

Just before Christmas, after long debates at General Synod, the Bishops authorised prayers that allow for same-sex couples to be blessed in a Church service. You may have views on this that range from "about time," to "so what," to "how can the Church of England even call itself Christian." It does, it can, and it is. It is well above your pay grade, and mine, to decide who is and who isn't accepted by God.

Our PCC's will be debating these changes and the authorised prayers over coming meetings and deciding how each parish should best respond. As individual Christians we must also decide how we respond. To do this I would like to draw your attention back to the pastoral principles introduced with the Living in Love and Faith discussions. Any Christian community would do well to take these to heart, as I believe they offer an excellent approach to being God's people together in all aspects of our common life.

They are:

Acknowledge prejudice

Speak into silence

Address ignorance

Cast out fear

Admit hypocrisy

Pay attention to power

I truly believe that any Christian and any Christian community committed to these values will be richer and deeper in its faith and better equipped to live the life Christ calls us to in our place and our time. This is not an easy way. The easy way is to build barriers and retreat behind them, turning backs on all that unsettles and disturbs. The Pharisees of Jesus' day were faithful people who had done just that. He loved them, but he also grieved for them. We must resist any temptation, over any issue, to do likewise. That will sometimes be a very difficult thing to do. But, if we do it together, and if we do it trusting that Christ is with us, then it is at least possible. And it will show. And true faith is always attractive.

The Real Buck Smoothy?

One name from the history of Hadstock has stuck in my mind. It's catchy, a little unusual and crops up several times in the Community Archives from the 1700s and 1800s.

Buck Smoothy was the head farmer in Hadstock who reportedly told villagers before the Hadstock Bread Riot of 1795 that "the market price (of bread) was 9d a loaf and if the baker refused this price, then they could not be hurt if they took their bread away".

Buck was also a significant farmer in the village during this period, farming over half the Parish land (almost 900 acres) and based at Manor Hall and Lower Farms. Before the Inclosure Act 1805 he was a tenant farmer for 645 acres of Lordship lands, farmed 112 acres of his own land, 45 acres of Church land and 90 acres for Thomas Buck of Linton (probably a relative). After the Act, whilst his own land holdings and Lordship lands had reduced, the Church land had increased to compensate for reduced tithes, so he farmed even more land.

Buck was born around 1755, but it is difficult to find a definitive record of his birth. He married Mary Wright on 8 January 1787 at St Botolph's Church, Hadstock. They had 10 children over 22 years, the first one born 6 months after their marriage: Thomas Buck, Stephen, Mary, Joseph, William, Richard, John, Sarah, Charles and Martha.

In 1816, Buck and Mary registered their ten 'children' with the non-conformist Free Church in Horn Lane, Linton. Their eldest son would have been 29. Their dates of birth were vouched for by a surgeon, who "attended Mrs Smoothy". This was the time when the meeting house was an old barn, which was pulled down in 1817 and the current building built in 1818.

What prompted him to move his family from St Botolph's and the established church, owners of land that he farmed, to a non-conformist church? Was he a benefactor to the Free Church?

Buck's Will dated 1832 is held in the Essex Record Office archives. He named his sons Thomas Buck and Joseph as Executors and gave them permission to sell off everything and make provision for the family. Specific bequests amount to £6,160, equivalent to over £570,000 today.

For his 'beloved wife Mary' he gives "such part of my Household Goods and Furniture Plate Linen and China as she shall make choice of not exceeding in Value the Sum of Fifty Pounds to and for her own proper use and also the Sum of One Hundred Pounds in Money to be paid to her within six Calendar Months next after my decease..."

He also directs his executors to invest £1,000 in Trust for her ongoing support.

Buck's ten children are named in the Will, and each considered in different ways, with £10 given to each of them for mourning expenses. His three married daughters receive an equal share. Stephen receives only £100, and Richard might have had a problem managing his money. Buck makes it clear that Thomas still owes him £460!

He was clearly already wealthy or became so. As well as the value of the estate, he apparently could afford to employ a surgeon 'to attend' his wife in childbirth for all their children, with the surviving ones reaching adulthood.

He also seems to have had a strong sense of fairness in his dealings. Was it a belief in social justice that led him to advise villagers about their right to pay a fair price for bread in 1795, when he was a young father himself, and move to a non-conformist church?



What do you think?

Buck Smoothy is buried at the Free Church in one of the large tombs in front of the building, together with Mary. Buck died in May 1835 aged 80 years. Mary died in November 1853 aged 83 years.



THE STORY

At the tail end of one of our book group meetings in Autumn, we were talking about fund raising suggestions for the Village Hall and Laura Corob-Cook proposed a Pantomime. Well, that idea certainly flew!

Laura and Jill O'Dwyer decided that they would direct, Laura's daughter wrote a script, potential actors and stage crew were approached and rehearsals in the Village Hall

started on 20 September.

Tickets, for 2 Thursday performances on 21 December, went on sale at the end of October. The evening performance was sold out by 4 November and the Matinee performance a few days later. The cast agreed to one more performance on Wednesday 20 December. All three performances, 180 tickets, were sold out by 24 November. The pressure was on.

Meanwhile, rehearsals continued twice per week, more talent was recruited and the pantomime began to take shape. Of course, not only the actors were involved. There was all the support team needed to bring the pantomime to life: costumes, lighting, music, evening refreshments, props, prompt, backdrops, scene changes, curtains and adapting the hall and much more.

The resulting performances were a triumph. The audiences were entertained and very impressed and the resulting community spirit and good humour was heartwarming. Huge congratulations and thanks are due to everyone involved.

The amount raised after expenses was astonishingly £1,377 and this has all been donated to Village Hall funds. We are immensely grateful and intend to use some of the money to replace the village hall's elderly fridge, ceramic cooker hob and to purchase a safer, more user-friendly option to our very heavy and unstable wooden step ladders. Also, as we have just spent over £1000 to replace the old broken urinals in the gents, this boost to our funds is very timely! Thank you again to everyone involved.
