## Looking for hope when all seems bleak

I saw my first scattering of snowdrops this morning, and my heart leapt. I'd been on the lookout for some on my daily walks, expecting to see them in a hedgerow or down by the river, but I came across this little group in a quiet corner of a churchyard. On a bright, crisp day, not a carpet of them, there were just a few amidst the gentle stillness of the gravestones. The grass around them was a fresh green, and there were a few brown leaves about, left over from autumn. I was so pleased to see them; I love the simplicity of snowdrops, their humility even, and their purity.

I also admire the courage of snowdrops. Even in the hardest of winters, they bravely poke their way through the snow and, although this year we can't really claim to have had a hard winter, they still serve to signal the turning of the seasons. Long before there is any other sign of Spring, while our landscape is still as stark as the bare trees, and our boots are caked with gloopy mud, the little snowdrops tell us that the good earth is beginning to stir into new life, and that Winter's days are numbered. I suppose it's because of this that snowdrops have been associated with hope. Hope, before the hard times have come to an end, hope while it's still cold, and dark by teatime.

Apparently, snowdrops are also known as 'Candlemas Bells' because (like Michaelmas Daisies) they flower around the time of a Church Festival. The Festival of Candlemass marks the time when, at 40 days old, Jesus was taken by his parents to be 'Presented' in The Temple. As they entered, a blind old man called Simeon somehow recognised who this infant was, and knew that his long wait for the faithfulness to end was at hand. He felt he could die in peace knowing all would be well. There are verses in the Bible that record what he said:

"Lord, lettest now thy servant depart in peace; according to thy word.

For mine eyes have seen thy salvation ...."

Word's that are repeated everyday at the traditional Night Service they call Compline.

By the time you read this, I'm sure we will be surrounded by snowdrops, and may they bring you joy, but know that even in the darkest times, there are signs of hope.

Like Simeon, let's see them in the little things, the modest things, the pure things.

Let's see them in the people that have the courage to stand up for what is right, even if they have to push through adversity to do so.

On Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> November Janice Snell, the church Safeguarding Officer to mark Safeguarding Sunday, gave a powerful and thought provoking address on safeguarding and it is worthy of repeating for the benefit of all of us in the village. Should Janice's words prompt any one of you to think of someone or you yourself, please do not hesitate to speak to her as she suggests. We do hope you draw something positive from what follows.

Below is a precis of some of what Janice said. Safeguarding is about making sure everyone who walks through our church doors feels safe, respected, and cared for.

Safeguarding is about preventing harm — physical, emotional, spiritual, and financial. It's about being aware of the people around us, especially those who might be vulnerable. That could be a child, an older person, someone going through a rough patch, or someone who simply needs a bit of extra kindness. It's not just about rules and regulations. It's about creating a culture — a way of being — where people feel safe to be themselves. Where no one is overlooked, and no one is left to struggle alone.

We take concerns seriously and respond with care. We support anyone affected by harm.

We work hard to make this church a place of safety and respect — not just on Sundays, but every day. If you ever need to talk, or if something's worrying you, please get in touch. My details are in the porch.

Safeguarding isn't a one-off job It's something we keep doing, keep learning about, and keep getting better at.

Let's be known not just for our church services and unique door, but for being a church where people feel truly safe and cared for.

We live in a complicated world, but here in Hadstock, we can be a steady presence with open hearts, and open eyes,

By remaining receptive to ongoing learning, updating our procedures, and supporting one another in this essential work, we reinforce trust and compassion within our congregation. Although we operate within a complex world, our role as members of St Botolph's calls us to uphold principles of grace, care, and forgiveness wherever possible. Let us take deliberate and effective action, guided by our values, to make meaningful improvements—beginning today.

- By working with local partners, we support rural communities to gain access to clean water close to their homes and to invest in sustainable agriculture.
- By pioneering **sand dams**, we promote and support the application of sand dam technology by key stakeholders in drylands.
- By influencing and educating those who can help achieve our vision including – but not limited to – policy makers, international NGOs, government departments and civil engineering firms.

## Our charitable objects

- To promote the conservation, protection and improvement of the physical and natural environment for the public benefit; and
- To relieve poverty, in particular but not exclusively, by supporting sustainable development\* projects; and
